

Senseless vandalism

Halton Regional Police in Oakville are searching for the persons responsible for thousands of dollars in damage to windows and vehicle windshields which has taken place throughout Oakville during the past several months.

Windows in bus shelters have been the main target for the vandals. There has been, however, a marked increase in damage reported to school windows and store front windows as well as vehicle windshields.

Police investigators have determined that the majority of the damage is being caused by the use of a slingshot-type weapon using ball bearings, lead weights or glass marbles.

In one incident witnesses reported a brown car, possible a Chevrolet, with four occupants, stopped beside a bus shelter. One of the occupants shot out the windows of the shelter before the car drove away.

More backing for seniors' cause

Icy road conditions caused a lower than expected turnout at the general meeting of the Georgetown and District Seniors Association held at St. Andrew's Church recently.

The group, formed last fall to raise funds for a local recreation centre for seniors, met this week to organize a membership drive. "We could have several hundred memberships eventually," said public relations manager Florence Smith.

But Mrs. Smith said "unfortunately, we didn't have the numbers we expected."

Halton Hills Mayor Russ Miller dedicated "100-per-cent support" to the seniors cause at the meeting. Town Councillors Al Cook, Ann Currie and Rob Heaton were present at the meeting to show their support, as well.

Small donations were made at the general meeting, said Mrs. Smith. She said plans for fundraising have not yet been made but the

committee is "open to suggestion."

And suggestions are not limited to the seniors, she says.

"We are also looking for younger people because one day, they will use the building," she said.

The building does not yet have a proposed site, said Mrs. Smith, and the group without being "constituted" or "incorporated" is not prepared to discuss a potential home for the recreation centre.

But Mrs. Smith added that the

membership meeting moves the committee closer to getting a seniors' recreation centre.

Expansion to the Georgetown Water Supply Environmental Study Report Well No. 21

NOTICE OF COMPLETION OF ENVIRONMENTAL STUDY REPORT MARCH 15, 1989

As a requirement under Ontario's Environmental Assessment Act, the Regional Municipality of Halton hereby notifies all interested individuals and parties that the Environmental Study Report (ESR) for the above-mentioned project has been completed. Subject to the comments received as a result of this Notice and the receipt of this Notice and the receipt of other approvals as necessary, the Regional Municipality of Halton intends to proceed with the construction of the above-mentioned project.

The purpose of this undertaking is to provide additional groundwater supplies for the Georgetown South Planning Area, through the construction of a 900 cubic metre/day well, located near this intersection of Regional Road No. 10 and 10th Line. It is proposed to construct this well in the summer of 1989 at an estimated cost of \$350,000.

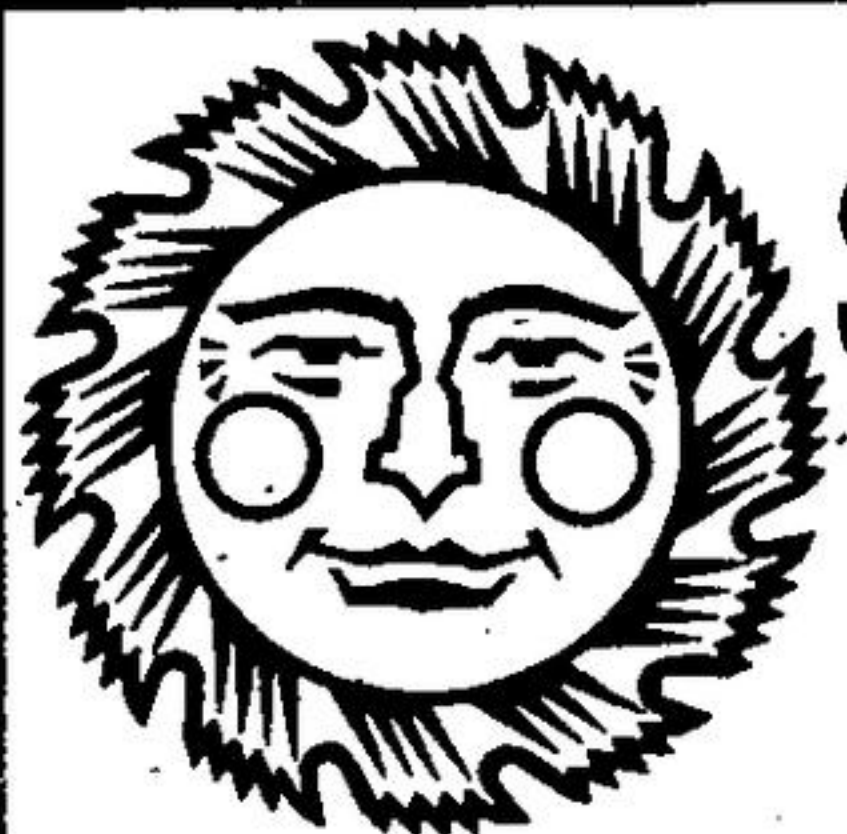
