Glen Eden expanding

Commencing the spring of 1989, Glen Eden Ski Area will be undertaking a \$1.5 million expansion to the snowmaking facilities and slopes.

The project, which was developed by Delta Engineering, will involve a new compressor building, two new 3000 CFM Air Compressors, water pumps to pump 1200 gallons per minute, a pipeline extension, an electrical sub station, and a new ski run under the Twister Chairlift (with lighting).

This project will almost double our present snow making capacity allowing earlier start up for skiing in December and guarantee 100 per cent coverage for the Christmas break. Also the expansion will increase the skiable terrain by one slope and prepare the area for the next phase of expansion.

This expansion is part of Glen Eden's development plans that commenced in 1987 with the installation of the new triple chairlift and will carry on over the next five years with new facilities being developed to handle Glen Eden's constantly growing skier market.

Triathlon becoming major sport

TORONTO-It appears triathlon is on its way to becoming a major sport in Canada.

Royal LePage, Canada's leading realtor, has announced the company will sponsor a six-race national triathlon series, the first series of its kind in Canada. The sponsorship represents a \$250,000 commitment from Royal LePage and the prize package will total over \$100,000.

Among the events in the national series are the Canadian Long Course (Half Ironman) Championship in Orillia, on Aug. 20 and the Canadian Short Course (Olympic distance) championship in Calgary on July 23. Both events have been sanctioned by the Triathlon Association of Canada (TriCan), the governing body of the sport in Canada.

On hand for the recent announcement were Nick Taylor, 1988 Canadian Triathlon champion, and Scott Tinley, one of the top triathletes in the world. Tinley is a two-time, winner of the famous

Ironman triathlon in Hawaii.

According to Bob Benson, Public Relations Manager for Royal LePage: "Triathlon is an amazing success story in sports. In a very short period of time it has attracted a huge following. Triathlon

events in North America will attract well over 1 million entries in 1989.

"Moreover, it's a grass roots sport, attracting not only professional athletes but thousands of amateurs who participate purely for the challenge."

In addition to the national circuit, named the Canadian Triathlon Series, Royal LePage will fund a number of provincial events, including an seven-race Ontario series, the Quebec Championships (St. Sauveur), the Ontario Championships in Grimsby, and the Royal LePage Edmonton Triathlon.

With the exception of the long course race in Orillia which covers the half-Ironman distance, the triathlons in the Royal LePage series are Olympic distance events

1.5 km swim, 40 km bike and 10 km run. A top ranked triathlete can complete this course in under two hours.

By comparison, a full Ironman distance, such as the event in Hawaii, covers a course that includes a 2.4 miles swim, a 112 mile bike and a 26.2 mile run. A top international athlete can cover the Ironman distance in under nine hours.

A survey of people who take part

in triathlons revealed some unique characteristics. The average age of triathletes, for example, is 34 years, and the average family income is over \$50,000 per year. Women account for 25 per cent of triathletes. The events in the Royal LePage series includes age

categories for athletes over 60

years old.
