Bowlers strike gold

A pair of Georgetown bowlers went north in search of gold and they found it at the Ontario Winter Games in North Bay.

Sandy Weeks, 17, and Christina Lane, 14, both of Georgetown, were part of the Central Ontario West team that won the gold medal at the Winter Games fivepin bowling competition on Mar. 9-12 in the northern Ontario city.

Over the four-day competition the Central West representative squad bowled 10 games, finishing in first place overall with 56.5 points, a full two points ahead of second-place Southwestern Ontario. In the semi-finals Central West topped Central East before stopping Northeastern Ontario inthe gold medal final.

Weeks and Lane qualified for berths on the five-girl Central West regional team after surviving a gruelling play-off competition in Streetsville prior to the Winter Games.

The Georgetowners bowled-off against 65 other top bowlers from the region and finished among the top five to earn spots on the team.

The final obstacle the girls had to clear to win a trip to North Bay was completed in Hamilton where the Central West squad finished first against four other zone teams hoping to represent the region.

Weeks also just missed winning a medal in the girls individual bowling competition, finishing in fourth place in the final bowl-off and coming to within 30 points of the bronze medal.

Lane also put forth a strong day on the alleys in the individual competition, placing ninth overall.

It was an all-Halton final for the Grand Championship of the 29th annual GMHA International Bantam Hockey Tournament as Milton doubled up on Oakville, 8-4, to win the 1989 title last Saturday at Alcott Arena.

Mike Cox scored two goals, including the eventual winner in the second period, to lead Milton's cupwinning offence. Cox capped his strong performance in the final game by receiving the tourney's coveted MVP Award following the contest.

Milton led throughout the final, taking a 3-1 first period lead and increasing the margin to 5-3 in the second before icing the cake with a trio of third period markers.

Cox's eventual game-winning tally came at 9:29 of the second period as he took a pass from teammate Pat Henneberry off a centre ice face-off and zoomed into the Oakville zone to beat netminder David White. That goal, which at the time gave Milton a 5-2 lead, came just nine seconds on the heels of Henneberry's first goal of the night which was assisted by

Cox. The Cox-Henneberry connection proved to be a good one for Milton as Henneberry scored his second of the night in the third period, also assisted by Cox, while Cox's first goal in period one was also set up by Henneberry. Tyler McManns potted a hat trick for Oakville.

Milton finished preliminary round play with a 1-2 slate before doubling up on Cambridge, 6-3, in the B division final. Oakville, meanwhile, had a 2-1 first round slate before they dumped Chinguacousy, 5-1, to take the A division title.

In earlier semi-final action on Saturday, Milton advanced to the final with a 4-2 win over D division champions Pickering while Oakville downed Port Perry (C division winners) by a 6-3 count.

Port Perry had earlier claimed the C crown with a rousing 12-2

trouncing of Agincourt, with Pickering taking the D crown banner with a 6-2 defeat of Brampton on Friday.

Georgetown's two representatives in the 1989 puckfest, the Bantam B's and Bantam Minors, didn't fare quite as well as they had hoped they would. After losing their tourney openers both squads went on to lose their next two contests as well, to miss playoff competition. The M and M Pro Sport "AA" Bantams were unable to compete due to OMHA playoff commitments.

After dropping their opener in a close 3-2 loss to Hanover, the Johnson and Associate Bantam B's were blanked 5-0 by Paris and finished their week with a 4-1 loss to eventual division winners, Pickering. Brad Tutt scored the ione Georgetown goal in that one, with Chris Burrows and Alan Fudge drawing helpers.

The Chateau Restaurant Minors came back from a tourney-opening 6-0 loss to Pickering to put in a strong effort against Brampton, dropping a 5-4 contest. The Minors last game of the week saw them take a 7-2 knockout punch from Paris.

Against Brampton, Tim Presswood led the way with two goals and an assist while Derek Ellard also had a pair of tallies. Shawn Pearson gathered two assists with Dave Osborne and Jeff Pettigrew helping out once each.

In the Paris loss, Matt Downs and Derek Ellard scored for Georgetown with Mark Johnston and Scott McGuigan earning assists.

Along with Cox's MVP Award following the championship game, Oakville's Morgan McNichol was presented with the Red and Jean Asseltine Trophy as the week-long tournament's Most Sportsmanlike Player.

Oakville's Jesse Robertson took home the Georgetown Referee's Association Trophy as the tourney's top goaltender and Milton's Peter McDuffe, an exintermediate Raider and former NHL netminder, earned Coach-ofthe-Tournament distinction.
