



But The Dinosaurs (Deneau Publishers) is not about what happened, but how dinosaurs would

have evolved. Dixon populates the planet with some rather strange creatures, complete with habitats and foodchain. The richly detailed artwork is spectacular.

Creatures such as the tromble, a 10-foot-tall, flightless bird with legs as massive as tree trunks, stalk through Dixon's world - a world that seems to get along just fine without homo sapiens.
