



Hooper pondering role with Raiders before May executive meeting

Possible changes within the Georgetown Raiders Jr. B Hockey Club will be discussed at a May 9 executive meeting, but it's likely that some major decisions will already have been made before that date.

Team president Dave Kentner said last Thursday that the usual club protocol will call for the yearend release of all vice-presidents at the May 9 meeting, after which nominations will be heard. "At that time we will name a vicepresident of hockey, a general manager and a coach," said Kentner.

Both current general manager Bob Hooper and head coach Peter Sturgeon have apparently been asked to return to the club next season in their respective positions. Both said last week they are currently considering their decisions.

"I've given it a lot of thought," said Hooper on Thursday. "I haven't made up my mind what I'm going to do next year. I'm still general manager at this moment and I'm proceeding with normal operations. If I'm going to do it (act as GM for another season) I'll tell them (Raider executive) within two weeks."

Meanwhile, Sturgeon says he would speculate he'll be returning to coach the Raiders next season, although he hasn't made a commitment to the organization yet. He indicated he was somewhat miffed with some negative statements, made about the team in the wake of its playoff exodus to Oakville in four straight games, the second time in two years that scenario has

occurred. "I've put a lot of time into the hockey team and would like to see the program continue," he said. "It's taken a tremendous amount of time on my part as coach. I don't like to walk away from the rink without a win, but I think Georgetown Jr. B is heading in the direction of a St. Mary's (St. Mary's Lincolns, a solid organization in the Western Jr. B Hockey League) in that we are a team bringing in young players to develop."

Sturgeon said while negative statements about the club wouldn't affect his decision about returning to the Raider bench next year, he did say the club had to be patient.

"We did a lot of work to see what it would take for us to be a hockey community. The foundation is laid and the program is in place. Now we've got kids that want to come to. Georgetown. Things are headed in a positive direction, I've talked to some Toronto area general managers and there could be some surprises next year."

Hooper, meanwhile, concurred with Sturgeon on the positive movement made by the club in the past couple of seasons, although he expressed disappointment with the playoff record. "We've done a lot with the hockey team, made a lot of changes, but we've lost a lot of hockey games (in the playoffs) and that feels bad. If I leave the club that'll make me feel bad. You see Etobicoke advance (the Capitals won the Central loop's western division playoff final recently) and we were pretty well even-steven

with them during the regular season (2-3-2).

"We've just got to learn how to beat Oakville," he quipped.

Hooper feels the Hooper-Sturgeon combination has been a strong one for the local Jr. B outfit. "Peter did a lot of the general manager's work last year and that was the idea. He did some and I did some. We'd probably do the same thing again. We'd like to add some depth in the managerial and coaching positions. Pete's not going to stay with the B's forever and we have to build with that in mind."

As for any minor changes and tinkering within the managerial and coaching ranks, Hooper said that would have to wait. "You've got to make the top decisions before you make the bottom ones," he said.

There have been hints that Hooper might be offered a vicepresident's position but the current GM did not wish to expand on that topic. "I'll reserve comment on that," he said.

As for his decision on whether or not to return as GM next year, Hooper said his decision will be, "non-negotiable."

Bantam bowlers roll back. to clinch Ontario silver

A group of young Georgetown athletes proved that last-minute comebacks are not just reserved for hockey overtime periods and extra innings in baseball.

ing last-minute comeback as the local squad rolled to a silver medal in the Ontario championships on Mar. 19 in Scarboro.

"They didn't quit," said proud coach Ralph Miller of his fiveman team. "They were in second place after the first game and dropped again after the second game. But in the third game they came right back with an 855 to take the silver."

The team of Martin Johnston, Kevin Shapcott, Chris Gostlin, Chris Wilkes and Matthew Walker took the Ontario silver medal with an overall score of 2443 (with a 373 pins-overaverage as a team), under 100 points less than the gold medalwinning Hamilton team. Oshawa took third with a 2363.

"It was pretty good when you consider this was their first major competition," said Miller.

The Georgetown crew bowled an 843 in game one of the final, hit

for a 745 in game two and roared back for gold with an 855 in game three. Shapcott ended the day with an individual 399, Wilkes had a 463, Walker was 494, Johnston Georgetown Bowl's bantam hit 512 and Gostlin counted 575.

The locals topped all but one of 17 opposition teams at the Scarboro roll-off after having won the 14-team regional competition in Guelph on Feb. 19.

While Miller was impressed with his team's comeback win he was equally pleased with the show of sportsmanship displayed by his young charges. "They conducted themselves as good sports throughout the competition," he said.

"I was also impressed with the encouragement the kids received from the parents, and especially from Grant Somers who doesn't even have a youngster on the bantam team but who is always out there supporting us," said Miller. "It helps to have the fans behind you, especially when you come back in the third game."
