Touring midgets have big game left

Spring may be here but there's plenty of hockey left for the Georgetown Sunny Acres Farms Midgets.

The midget squad winged its way to Vancouver, B.C. yesterday where it will take part in the Coquitlam International Midget Tournament, an annual hockey festival attracting high calibre teams from across Canada and the Pacific Northwest.

Meanwhile, the Sunny Acres club will have one more important

game left on its agenda when it returns home on Apr. 3. A thrilling 3-3 overtime tie with Brampton last Saturday night at Alcott Arena left the two clubs in a do-or-die situation with the Tri-county midget championship six-point series tied at five points apiece.

They'll hook up again on Apr. 6 at Brampton's Memorial Arena to decide the league title.

On Saturday, the two teams were knotted at 2-2 when they entered the regulation 10-minute overtime period. Both clubs notched a goal apiece in the extra time and ended the affair a 3-3 sawoff.

Darren Lang, Bill McDonald and Dale McNiven scored the Georgetown goals.

As for the B.C. tournament, for which the Sunny Acres crew has been conducting fundraising pro-

jects since the beginning of the hockey season, Georgetown general manager Wayne Pries says the midgets will have their work cut out for themselves.

"They're all triple-A teams out there so it will be tough," he said. "But when you look at the bantam tournament (29th GMHA International Bantam Tournament two weeks ago) all the double-A teams beat the triple-A teams, so anything can happen."

Georgetown opens its tournament schedule today against the host Coquitlam team and will enter either the championship or consolation rounds depending on its result.

Pries said the Sunny Acres team was heading into the B.C. trip with a full roster and with all skaters healthy.

Teams needed

The first pitch for the 1989 Georgetown Industrial Fastball League season will be hurled on May 24 and at least four clubs will be vying for GIFL supremacy this summer.

Defending champion Bluebirds along with Georgetown Reds, Apple Auto Glass and Howell's Plumbing will all be back in the fastball circuit this year with only Mike Adams leaving the lodge. League official Jim Hall said on Monday that the league would definitely run with four clubs but was hoping for two more possible entries in 1989.

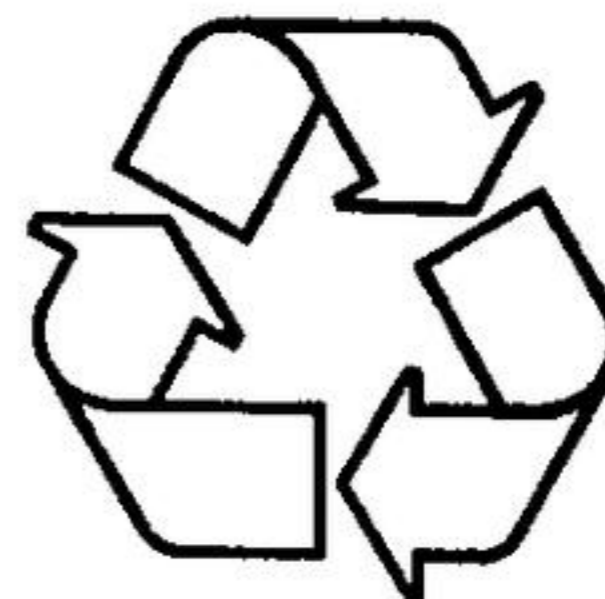
Pool registration
