

Stinson, Tabuchi, Zuraw, Smallwood lead Fins

Mandy Stinson led the way for the Georgetown Blue Fins swim team as she splashed to a third and a fourth in the Level I competition at the Cobra Invitational in Brampton on Mar. 11-12.

At the Aquanauts Meet on Feb. 12 in Toronto, the Georgetown results were as follows:

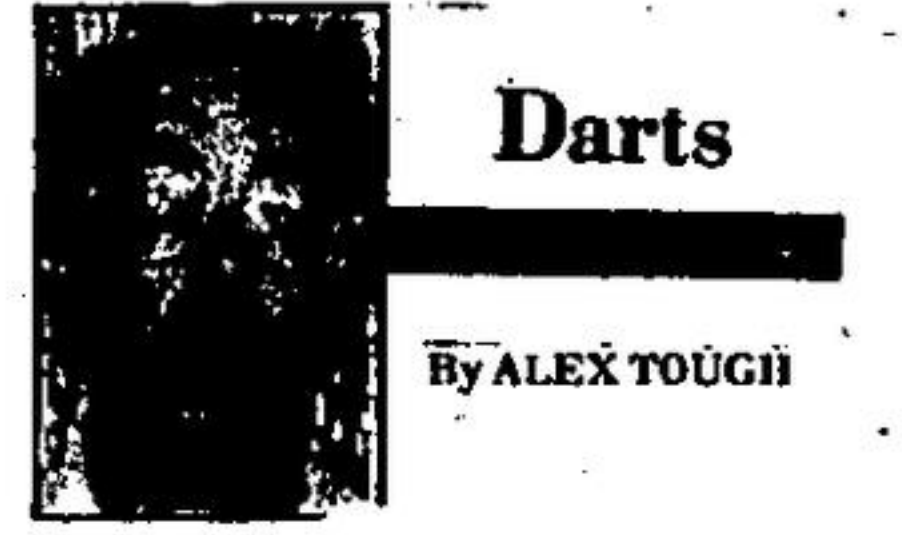

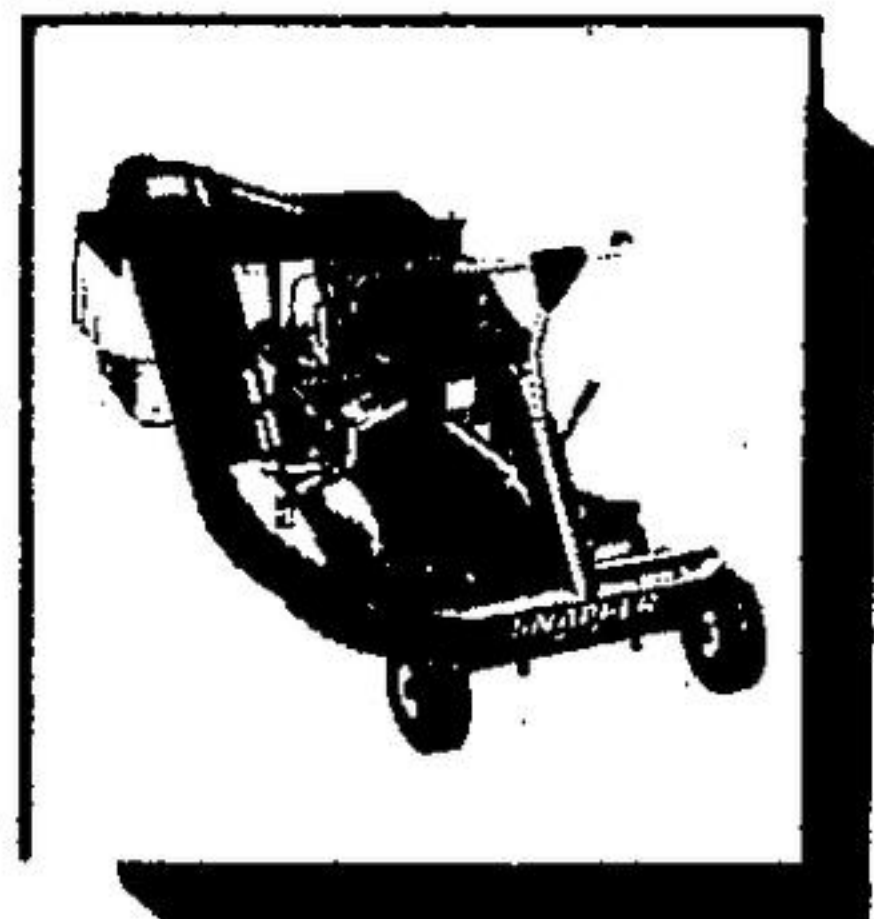
