The week comes to a brilliant conclusion with the fabulous toe tapping thythms of The National Tap Dance Company at 8 p.m. on Saturday, May 6 in "Fascinating Rhythma."

Co-founders, William Orlowski and Steve Dymond, established The National Tap Dance Company of Canada in 1976 to demonstrate that tap dancing can be more than showy virtuosity. As Dymond says, "We are dancers, not hoofers; we showcase performers, not routines." In 1977, Mr. Orlowski and Mr. Dymond choreographed a concert set to Bach's Brandenburg, Concerto No. 3, which has become the company's signature piece. This piece has been performed at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York and numerous other locations. The National Tap Dance Company has appeared on television on various CBC specials, the Shields and Yarnell Christmas Special (1982) and, in 1985, their performance at the Quebec Sum-



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Mister Donut mit Gala for President Reagan and Prime Minister Mulroney was broadcast by the CBC. The group also performs regularly with the Toronto Symphony and the National Arts Centre Orchestra in Ottawa, both conducted by Erich Kurzel. They have the distinction of selling out a 1964 performance at Roy Thomson Hall and a 1986 Ontario Place Forum concert.

The National Tap Dance Company is one of Canada's national treasures. The company has been built entirely from Canadian talent, providing dancers, composers, choreographers, musicians and designers with the opportunity to continue to develop their art in their own country. It was fitting that they performed at Expo '86 in Vancouver at the Canada and Ontario pavilions. They have represented Canada worldwide with appearances in China and Bermuda.

Around the world and now at our very own Cultural Centre on May 6, The National Tap Dance Company performs "Fascinating Rhythms." Tickets are \$12.50 per person and are going fast. With such a hard working, dedicated team, Globe's spring show is sure to be a great success.






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
