The \$12,500 Wintario Development grant was announced recently by Etobicoke West MPP Linda LeBourdais on behalf of Ontario Minister of Tourism and Recreation Hugh P. O'Neil.

The OCA will design a strategy to secure financing for the project, which is expected to cost more than \$1.2 million.

The Toronto Ontario Olympic Council, which is bidding to host the 1996 Olympic Games, has designated the velodrome as the Olympic cycling site.

The grant," Mr. O'Neil said, "will help the provincial cycling association reach their fundraising goals."
