

Police Beat

Man pinned

A Guelph man is listed in satisfactory condition in the Georgetown hospital after being involved in an industrial accident during the morning of April 15 at Armstrong Avenue. Craig Spilsbed, 35, was taken to hospital after being pinned down by a beam he was attempting to lift using a hoist.

Shrimp bagged

An Acton woman was charged with shoplifting at Miracle Food Mart at 235 Guelph St. April 14 at 10 a.m. Police say the woman was arrested in connection with the theft of five jars of baby food, two bags of shrimp and two packages of meat totalling \$48.59. The woman, 23, will appear in court May 23.

Scotsdale damage

Halton Regional Police report some buildings and a Ford pickup truck located on Scotsdale farm near Ballinafad, were damaged sometime between April 11 and April 15. Police say the windows of the buildings were apparently smashed by pellets from a pellet gun. The total damage is valued at \$1,500. Scotsdale farm is used as a location for the CTV television series, The Campbells.

House was 'ransacked' by daylight burglar

Crime Stoppers of Halton and Halton Police investigators in the Milton area are seeking your assistance in the identification of those responsible for the daylight entry of a home that resulted in the theft of thousands of dollars in electronic equipment.

On Thursday, February 14, 1989, the owners of a home located on the south side of Sideroad 20, east of the Fourth Line returned home at 3:30 p.m. to discover that an entry and theft had occurred sometime during the day. The residence had been entered by forcing a door and entering the house from a breezeway.

The entered house was thoroughly searched although no damage or ransacking had occurred. Stolen from the residence were the following items:

- Classic microwave oven, model ER652M, brown with black front;
- Complete Fisher stereo system with equalizer-amplifier, compact disc player, cassette deck and speakers;
- Pentax 35mm single lens reflex camera, type PE with flash equipment, tripod, 200mm and



wide angle lens;

- Complete Commodore, model 1541 computer system with monitor, disk drive, keyboard and printer;
- Sony video camcorder;
- 21" Stihl chainsaw;
- Numerous household items, including men's gold jewellery and a small amount of cash.

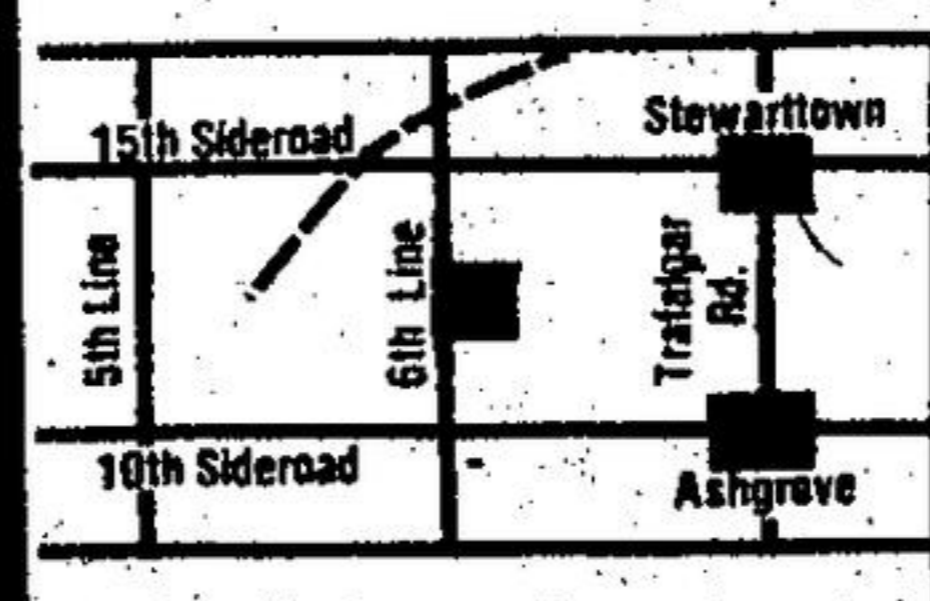
