The Regional Municipality of Halton, in conjunction with the Town of Halton Hills and the On-tario Ministry of the Environment is planning the above mentioned project, pursuant to the Environmental Assessment Act.

The purpose of the Glen Williams Water Supply Study is to:

- · Determine the nature of any deficiencies in private groundwater supply.
- · identify and evaluate corrective measures.
- · Assess impacts on sewage disposal systems, and,

· Recommend solutions.

The study will follow the Class Environmental Assessment for Municipal Sewage and Water Projects, as laid out by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment. Accordingly, public involvement and participation will be requested.

The study has been divided into three phases, which are:

Phase I - Identification of the Problem.

- Identification of Alternative Solutions to Resolve the Problem.

- Examination of Alternative Design Concepts for the Preferred Implementation Plan.

If any member of the public or an agency or Ministry has a concern that cannot be resolved between themselves and the proponents, then the concern may be sent by them to the Minister of the Environment for resolution. If the concern is significant enough, a full individual environmental assessment may be required by the Minister.

May 3 at 6:30 p.m. and all lady curlers are urged to attend.


