## Canada Packers wants town services for Beardmore lands

Canada Packers is asking the Town of Halton Hills to provide sewage service for an Acton property Mayor Russ Miller has called "the most contaminated piece of property" in Southern Ontario.

The Haltol Hills mayor referred to 300 acres of land owned by Canada Packers Incorporated in south-central urban Acton. The company presently services its own sewage treatment through a spraying system.

"Understandably, they want to get out of their private lagoon spraying system," said town planning director Ian Keith. But Mr. Keith added that Acton's sewage supply is limited: "The town has to be careful," he said.

The town will not make a decision until consulting with the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. The Ministry of the Environment must also review Canada Packers' application.

Beardmore Tannery, closed several years ago. There are two existing buildings on the property, which occupy 93,000 sq. ft. and house 115 employees.

Canada Packers is asking the town to hook up sewage services only to these buildings.

vicing could not be provided for all the Beardmore lands.

Mayor Miller said that "nearly all their (Canada Packers') buildings lie within the floodplain of Black Creek.

"I would imagine it's the most contaminated piece of property in Halton Hills if not in southern Ontario," he said.

Mr. Keith said Canada Packers presently has an environmental impact study being conducted, and the Ministry of the Environment is presently "dealing with current plans," said town engineer Bob Austin. He added that ministry testing is being done "on a continuous basis."

"There is now ongoing discussion with the ministry," he said.

The town will not decide on whether or not to grant Canada Packers sewage service for about 17 acres of land near the buildings, until a second report goes to town The lands are on the site of the council from the planning depart-

A town bylaw allows for 25 taxi cabs within Halton Hills. There are presently 17, and there will be one more if Mr. Wilkinson's application is approved by town council.


