



Two people hurt

A Georgetown and an Oakville resident were taken to hospital Saturday morning after a two-car collision at the intersection of Highway 7 and Trafalgar Road. The Ontario Provincial Police say a 1987 Ford and a 1987 Toyota collided at the intersection. John Bourque, 21, was treated and released from Georgetown

hospital and William Dayton was transferred to Toronto General Hospital with chest injuries, where he is currently listed in fair condition in the intensive care unit. Police are still investigating the accident. (Herald photo)

PG Bell still on the picket lines

Contract negotiations between P G Bell of Georgetown and its unionized workers are still in limbo since the talks between the company and the union screeched to a halt nearly two weeks ago.

Over 50 members of the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers walked off the job at the Armstrong Avenue steel plant following a breakdown in contract talks April 13.

The IAM voted 80 per cent in favor of striking after they received what they called an "inadequate" two-year package from the company. They have been without a contract since January.

P G Bell Division of Jannock Steel Fabricating Company offered the union a five-per-cent annual increase in the package, says IAM business representative Brian Short. Mr. Short added that the union was asking for 10 per cent and a new pension plan. He said the company has never had a pension plan.

Mr. Short said the IAM sent two letters including one by registered mail, to the company last week requesting renewed talks, but there was no response.

"Obviously the company wants to hold tight and put a little pressure on the guys on the (picket) line," said Mr. Short. The over 50 IAM union members from P G Bell have been striking in six-hour shifts, 24-hours a day.

But P G Bell vice-president of operations Paul Gri says the union

representatives "know what they have to do at this point."

"The union knew our position when they went on strike and our position hasn't changed," he said.

Mr. Gri refused to confirm or deny that the company had received IAM's letters.

The starting salary at P G Bell is presently \$11.21 an hour. But IAM members also want increased benefits and a pension plan.

The company said last week that they offered the union a pension through an RRSP plan. They also say they offered improved benefits.

At this time, the company refuses to say what its next step

will be.

The IAM workers continue their walk-out at P G Bell, a company that hasn't had a strike in its 30 years in Georgetown.

"The morale is still very good at the picket lines. The guys are very upbeat and obviously plan on staying out," Mr. Short said.

"We do have an amended position ready to submit."

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No applicants for inspector's position

The Town of Halton Hills, having difficulty hiring a building inspector for \$23,000 to \$34,000, is upping the ante to attract a more experienced person.

"Our recent attempts to recruit building inspectors have resulted in no interest being shown in the building inspector salary range of (from) \$23,370 to \$28,268 and very little interest in the senior building inspector salary range of (from) \$28,268 to \$33,931," says a town report released by the town's administrator-clerk Dan Costea.

The town building staff is recommending a new position of building inspector and code enforcement of-

ficer be created at a salary of between \$33,931 and \$39,774.

A new salary and position were allowed for in the town's 1989 budget.

The planning staff says they find themselves in a "predicament" with "unsuccessful recruitment and a very busy building year on the horizon."

Examples of the busy year include housing, apartment and commercial construction scheduled to take place.

Building code enforcement is considered to be a key area of the building department's administrative activity this year.

CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT FOR MUNICIPAL SEWAGE AND WATER PROJECTS GLEN WILLIAMS WATER SUPPLY STUDY PUBLIC COMMENT NOW BEING ACCEPTED

The Regional Municipality of Halton, in conjunction with the Town of Halton Hills and the Ontario Ministry of the Environment is planning the above mentioned project, pursuant to the Environmental Assessment Act.

The purpose of the Glen Williams Water Supply Study is to:

- Determine the nature of any deficiencies in private groundwater supply.
- Identify and evaluate corrective measures.
- Assess impacts on sewage disposal systems, and.
- Recommend solutions.

The study will follow the Class Environmental Assessment for Municipal Sewage and Water Projects, as laid out by the Ontario Ministry of the Environment. Accordingly, public involvement and participation will be requested.

The study has been divided into three phases, which are:

- Phase I - Identification of the Problem.
- Phase II - Identification of Alternative Solutions to Resolve the Problem.
- Phase III - Examination of Alternative Design Concepts for the Preferred Implementation Plan.

If any member of the public or an agency or Ministry has a concern that cannot be resolved between themselves and the proponents, then the concern may be sent by them to the Minister of the Environment for resolution. If the concern is significant enough, a full individual environmental assessment may be required by the Minister.

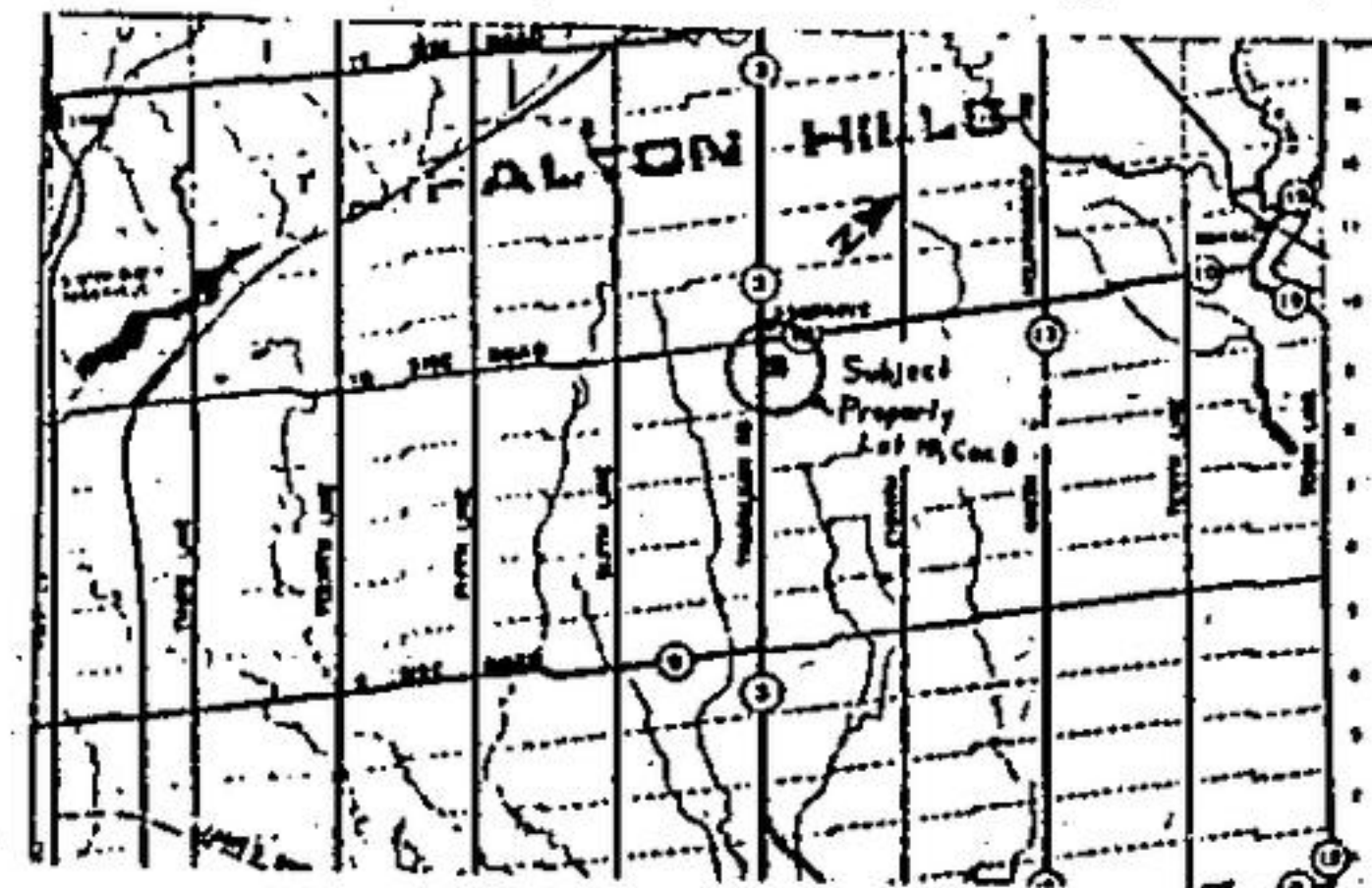

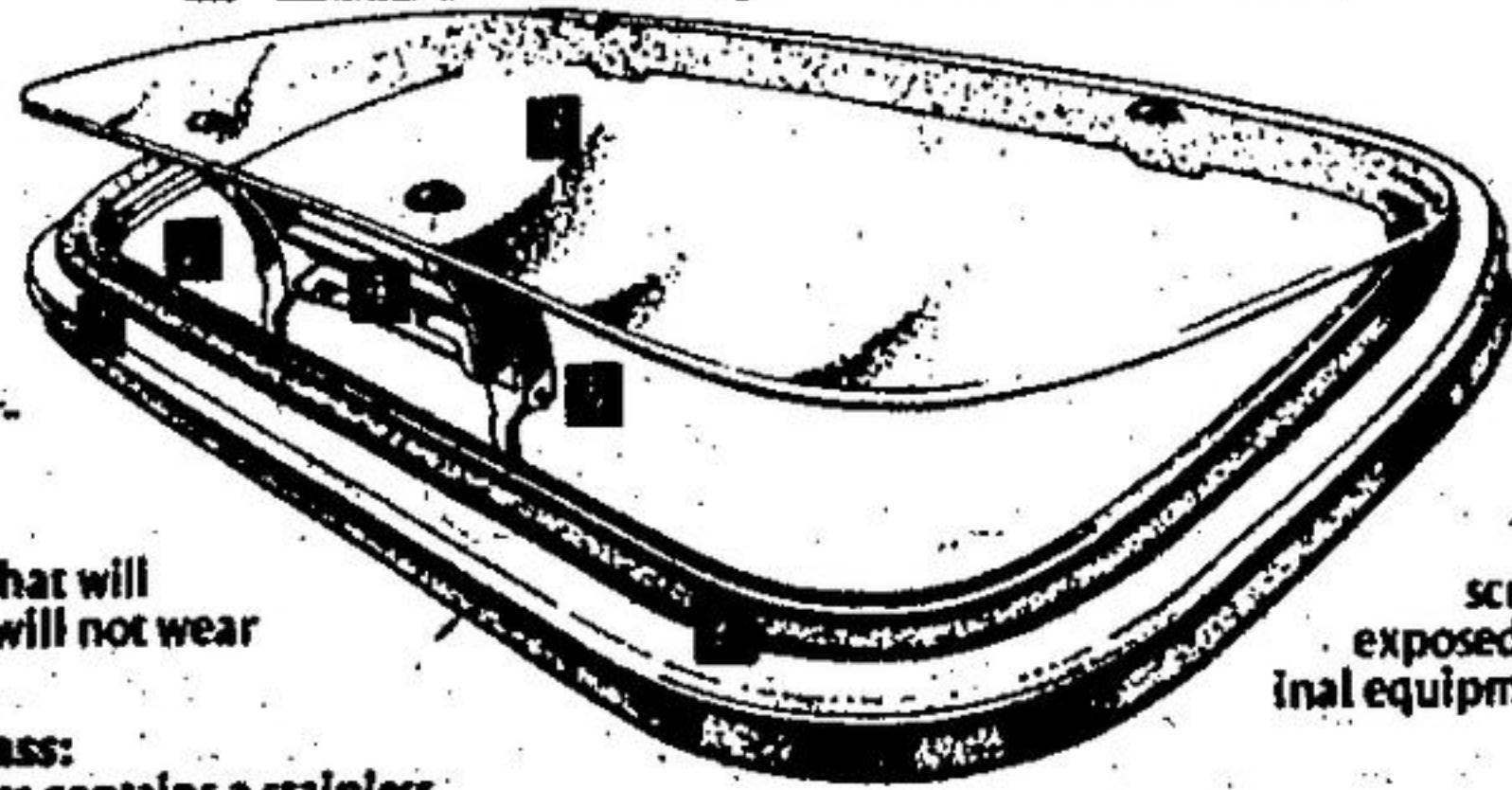

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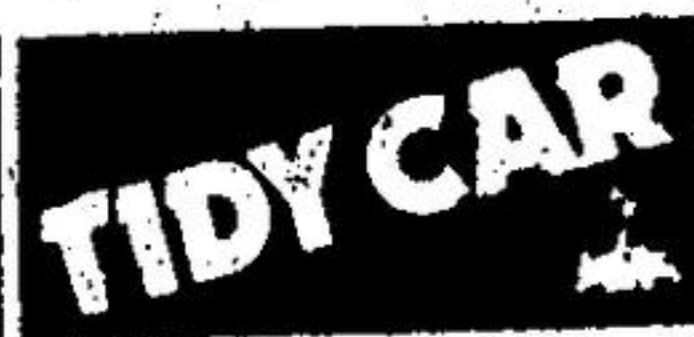
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
