

Police Beat

Money orders stolen

Halton Regional Police report someone broke into the Royal LePage office building at 170 Guelph St. and stole several Toronto Dominion money orders worth approximately \$100, sometime between 9 a.m. April 21 and early the next morning. Police say the thief entered the building through an unlocked door.

Window smashed

The rear window of a 196 Dodge van was smashed while parked at Centennial Middle School at 233 Delrex Blvd. at approximately 3:30 p.m. April 24. Police estimate the damage to be \$250.

\$150 damage

About \$150 worth of damage was caused as a result of someone throwing a chunk of dirt through the rear window at the Georgetown Christian School on Trafalgar Road north of Maple Avenue, police say.

Tool box stolen

Police say a red tool box containing a number of carpentry tools was stolen from a Ford pickup truck on Market St. sometime between the early afternoon of April 21 and the next morning. There was no sign of forced entry although police say the owner reported the van was locked.

Cigarettes stolen

A 28-year-old Georgetown man has been charged with theft under \$1,000, in connection with several packs of cigarettes which went missing from a Guelph Street variety store March 16. Police say the suspect entered the store, took the packages from a display case and then walked out. A court date has been set for May 15.

Dog catcher's fee now \$6 a day

Town councillors give and town councillors take away.

Halton Hills town councillors took a second look at a suggestion to pay the local dogcatcher \$10 a day for services, and found that the price was too high.

"That's a pretty stiff increase," said Coun. Pam Johnston, who led the debate against the increase from \$3 to \$10 Monday night.

"If you start looking at \$45 to \$50 (to get your dog out of the pound) that's a lot of money."

Coun. Johnston said people would leave their dogs in rather than pay large sums of money to get them back.

"At \$10 a day, it could very easily cost somebody \$80 or \$90 to get the dog out," said Coun. Norm Elliott.

"They say every dog has its day, but a lot will have a few less days," said Coun. Elliott, who explained that increased costs would mean more pets would be "put down."

Town bylaw enforcement officer Bob Ustrzycki said the impoundment costs plus any overdue costs must be paid before the pet is
