

Police Beat

Headphones stolen

Halton Regional Police report a walkman and headphones were stolen from an unlocked 1977 Ford parked at Bower Street and Elgin Street in Acton sometime during the early morning of May 5. The stolen property is valued at \$100, police say.

Charges laid

Police say a 27-year-old Erin man allegedly refused to submit to a breathalyser test after he was stopped as a result of a spot check at Mill Street and Acton Boulevard in Acton May 5 at 1:40 a.m. Police have laid charges of refusing to take a breathalyser test and a June 13 court date has been scheduled.
