

# Rebels prove hosts with the most

## HIGH SCHOOL

For the second year in a row the Georgetown Rebels proved to be the hosts with the most as GDHS ran away with first place overall in the relay portion of the annual Rebel Classic Invitational Track and Field Meet May 2.

Georgetown accumulated a whopping 272 points to take first overall with Oakville's White Oaks (83 points) and Burlington's Assumption (82) well behind in second and third, respectively.

GDHS also won the boys and girls teams titles with the Rebel men earning 142 total points to beat second place Bishop Reding (54 points) by almost 100 points while the Rebel women totalled 130 points to best second place Milton (50) by a full 80.

On the field side of the event, Georgetown finished second overall to Bramalea with the visitors stacking up 194 points to 126 for GDHS and 123 for third place White Oaks. Thanks in large part to a new school record by Trent Cull in the shot put, the GDHS men's team placed second in the field (Bramalea 129, GDHS and White Oaks 69 each) while the ladies ended up fourth.

Cull's heave of 16.08 metres in the midget shot put broke his own previous school record by almost two full metres and gave the Rebel thrower first place by over four metres over his nearest competition.

Lisa Carter's winning leap in the senior girls high jump marked the only other Rebel gold medal in the field competition.

But on the track, Georgetown was virtually unbeatable as the relay portion of the annual event had the Rebels winning 18 of 32 races.

Rebel teams took top spots in the following races: junior girls 4x800; senior boys 4x800; junior girls 4x100; midget and senior boys 4x100; midget and junior girls 4x400; midget, junior and senior boys 4x400; girls and boys open distance medley; junior girls 4x200; midget and senior boys 4x200; junior and senior girls medley and senior boys medley.

### Donker stars at Redmond meet

Bob Donker's trophy case will soon be burgeoning with hardware if the GDHS junior athlete continues his current torrid pace at local track and field meets.

For the second time this season Donker was voted the most outstanding junior male athlete of the meet as he led a strong GDHS performance at the Father Redmond Games in Etobicoke last weekend.

Donker blazed to first place in both the junior boys 1500 and 3000 in copping the top junior male honors.

Other top three finishes for GDHS came from Greg Workman in the midget boys javelin (third) and from the girls open 4x4 relay unit of Alexis Kerr, Sheri Nairn, Anna Toone and Lisa Carter which also earned bronze.

Other strong Rebel runs came from: Brent Couling, fourth, midget boys 800; Natalie Goldson, fifth, open girls 400 hurdles; Bill McDonald, sixth, junior boys 100; Kristy Johnson,

sixth, midget girls 800; Martin Davison, sixth, senior boys 3000; Jake Mashinter, seventh, midget boys 800; and the midget girls 4x100 relay team, seventh.

"Everyone's times came down," said GDHS head coach Bevin Clark. "It was a quality meet, there was some tough competition there from all over. We're in good shape for the Halton's."

The Halton Finals kicked off yesterday (no report available by press time) and will continue again on Friday at Burlington's Nelson Park.

### Scott sends strong message

Jennifer Scott sent another message out to her fellow Ontario high school competitors that she's definitely going to be a force to be reckoned with at OF-SAA this year as she claimed first place in the junior girls triple jump at the Father Redmond Games in Etobicoke last weekend.

Scott hopped, skipped and jumped for a total of 11.15 metres, setting a personal best mark in the process, as she led an impressive Acton Redmen field unit in Etobicoke. The junior student followed that gold medal performance with a silver in the long jump and a bronze in the javelin.

Tammy Richards followed suit by earning first place in the midget girls discus while Tracy Hagan took second in the same event.

Tanya Holley was a finalist in a very tough midget girls 100-metre final.

Over 2000 athletes attended the annual Father Redmond Games, one of the largest competitions in

the province prior to the June OF-SAA finals.

### Redmen throwers on target

Acton relay teams may not have appeared among the top three in track events at the annual Rebel Classic at Georgetown May 2 but a strong showing by the Redmen field crew did not go unnoticed.

Jen Scott again led the way for Acton, taking first place in the junior girls triple jump with a new meet record of 10.52-metres. Scott added gold in the junior girls long jump (4.72-metres) while Tracy Hagan (23.25-metres) and Tammy Richards (21.85) finished one-two in the midget girls discus event.

Leanne Prueter also threw to gold, in the junior girls discus, while Troy Foster was third (10.04) in the senior boys triple jump. Foster added a strong fourth place finish in the senior boys long jump with a 5.37-metre leap.

### Jupp leads Acton ruggers

The AHS Redmen junior rugby side took advantage of ideal playing conditions and a sunny afternoon last Thursday as they ran up their second consecutive win in Halton high school league play.

A total of six tries were scored by the red and white as they trounced the host M.M. Robinson Rams 32-3. The victory followed a bi come-from-behind win over arch-rival Georgetown Rebels two weeks ago and left the Redmen juniors at 2-1 on the season after opening the 1983 campaign with a home loss to Assumption Crusaders.

Kelly Jupp led the Redmen assault on Thursday by scoring a pair of tries from the wing while centre John McLean, winger Steve Shepherd, centre Tom Maines and fullback Paul Westaway scored one try apiece. David Craig and Jason Philip each booted a pair of two-point converts.

"They made the most of the dry ball with a fine display of basic rugby skills and fundamental plays," said Acton rugby co-coach Martin Lewis, himself a former senior representative player for Eastern Canada. "The harvest of tries by the three-quarters was only made possible by a strong control of the ball by our forwards and a clean service from the base of all scrums and lineouts."
