on her school swim team and has worked for a number of years at the Acton Indoor Pool. Natural enthusiasm will be reflected in the calibre of her programs.

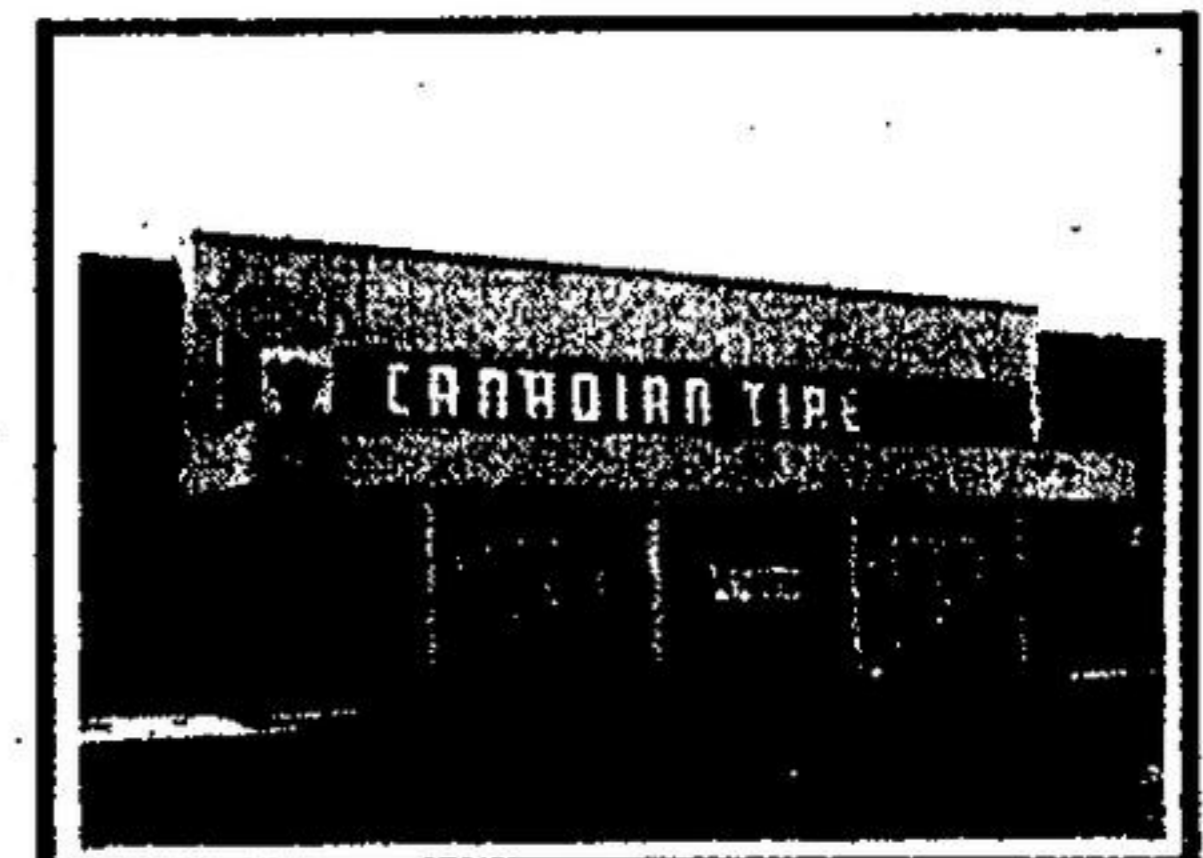
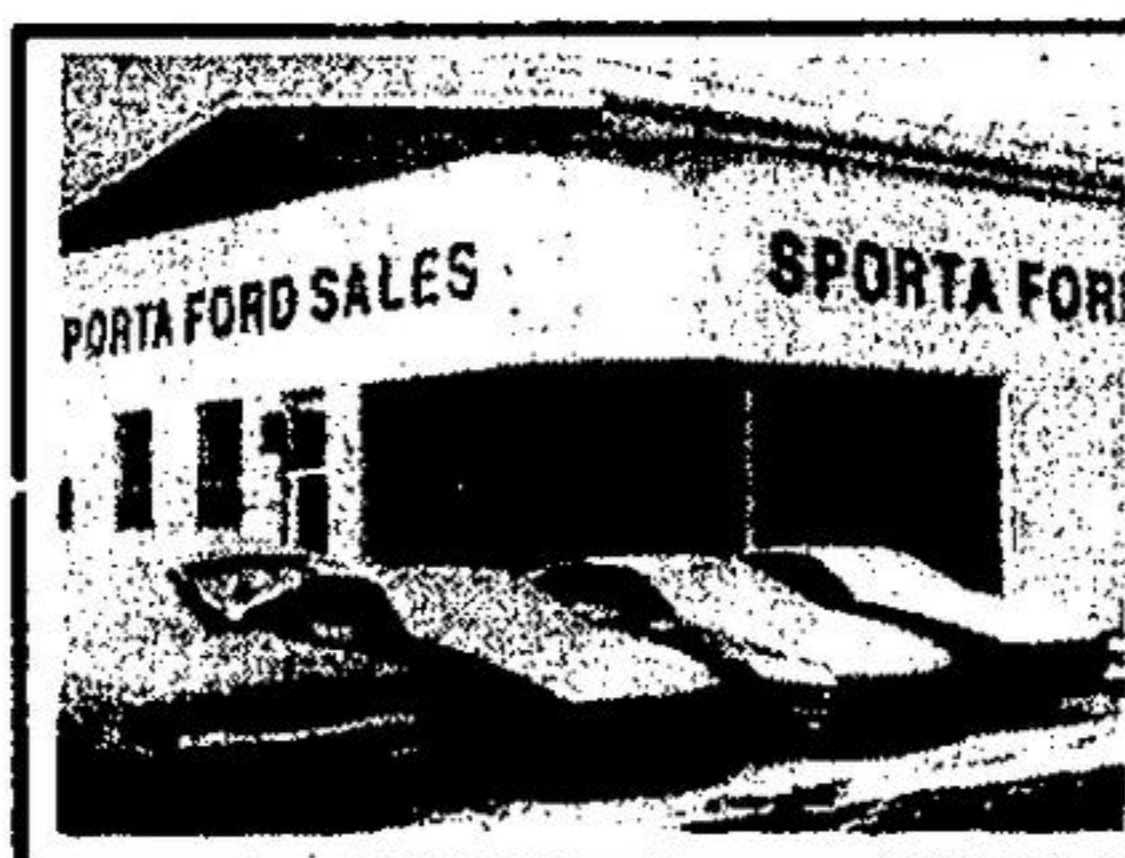
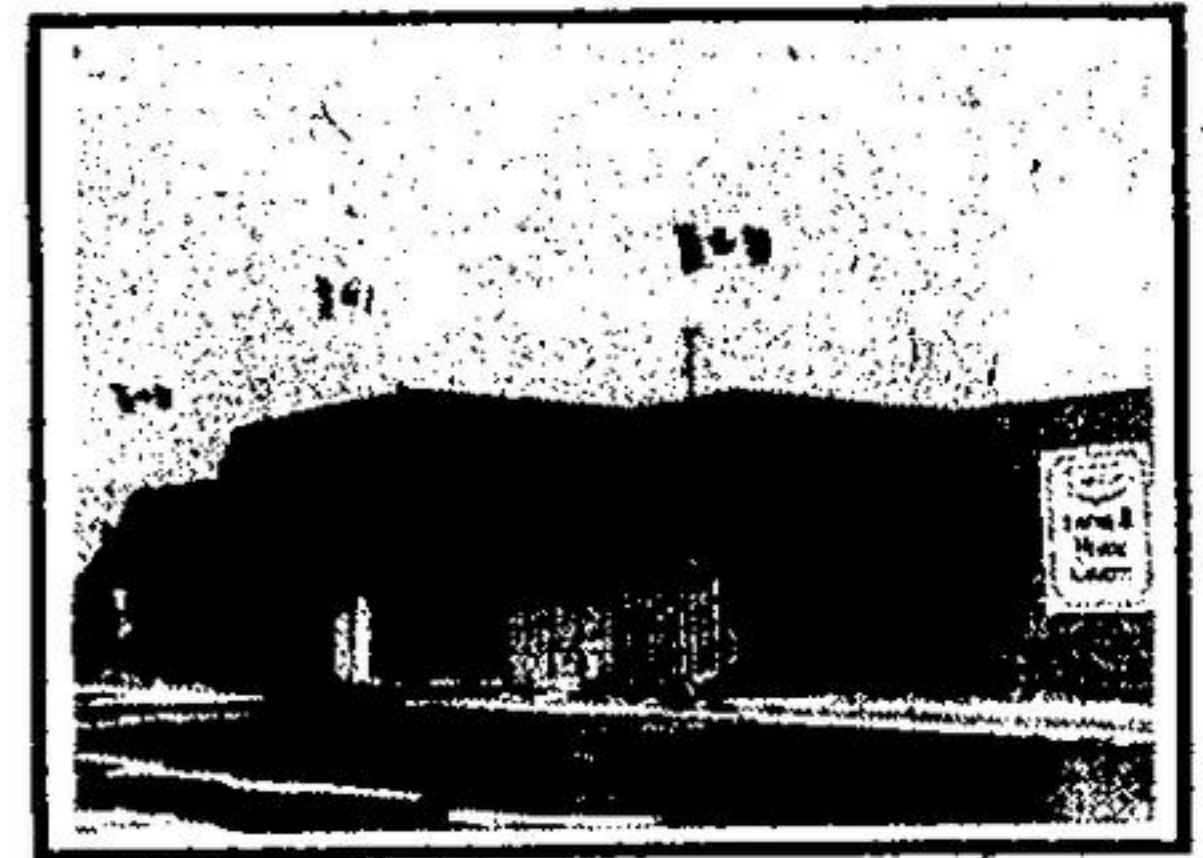
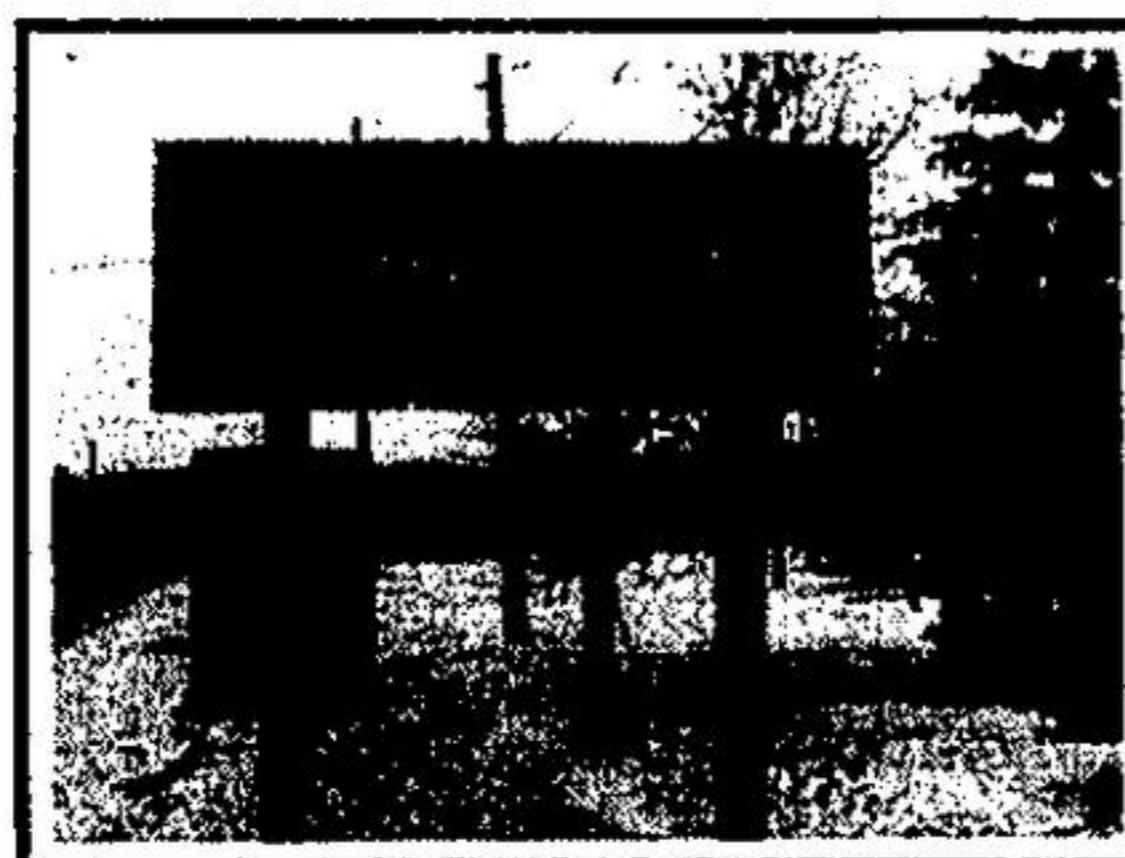
