
Will it be boom or bust in baseball?

Will there be a power shortage or boom in baseball in 1989?

Don't make your prediction - one way or the other - too quickly. A year or two can make a big difference. As the seasons change, so do home-run totals.

In fact, major-league home runs were at an all-time high in 1987. New season marks were set in both the American League (2,634) and National League (1,824). But things changed completely in 1988. So what's in store for '89?

Team totals in 1987 ranged from a high of 225 HRs by Detroit, to a low of 94 by St. Louis, the only squad below the century mark. Five '87 teams the Cubs, Giants, Tigers, Orioles and Blue Jays - surpassed the 200 plateau.

But last year home runs dropped significantly.

The Toronto Blue Jays led the majors in 1988 with a total of only 158 four-baggers. Five clubs failed to top 100 HRs last season - with the Cardinals again bringing up the rear, this time with only 71 circuit clouts.

Another way of looking at this dropoff is to examine the homer totals of regular players (for our purposes, those with at least 400 at bats).

There were 19 such players who slugged at least 10 home'runs more in 1987 than they did the previous season. Leading the pack was Chicago's Andre Dawson, who won the NL Most Valuable Player award. Dawson's 49 homers were 29 more than he hit in 1986. Will Clark of the Giants also showed an improvement of better than 20, jumping from 11 to 35.

On the other side of the coin, only four regulars - Bill Buckner, Jesse Barfield, Jim Morrison and Doug De-Cinces - had double-figure drops in home runs from '86 to '87. Buckner "led" the way, falling from 18 to 5 (minus 13).

The differences between 1987 and 1988 were dramatic.

Last season Andres Galarraga of the Expos and Jose Canseco of the Athletics were the only two major leaguers to stroke at least 10 home runs more than their 1987 totals. Galarraga upped his production by 16 from 13 to 29. And Canseco's 42 fourbaggers were 11 more than his previous year's figure.

On the other hand, double-figure falloffs were commonplace in '88.

Thirty big leaguers saw their HR totals drop by at least 10 last season. The player with the biggest decline, perhaps not surprisingly, was Dawson. After increasing his homer output by 29 in 1987, "Hawk" returned to earth with a total of only 24 roundtrippers last year - a dropoff of 25.

Six other players - Brook Jacoby (23), George Bell (23), Keith Moreland (22), Larry Sheets (21), Wally Joyner (21) and Dale Murphy (20) - saw their home-run totals plummet by 20 or more.

The overall result? A total of 1,279 homers were hit in the National

League in 1988, a decrease of 30 percent from 1987. The American League total of 1,901 was 28 percent fewer than the year before. That works out to an average of 49 fewer

homers per major-league team. The largest percentage increase in HR totals by a regular player in 1987 was 1,100 percent by Terry Pendleton of St. Louis (12 homers to 1). Galarraga's 123 percent jump was the largest last season.

Buckner's drop was 72 percent in 1987 (18 to 5). The biggest percentage fall last year was 88 percent by Keith Moreland (27 homers to 5).

· Of the 19 players who increased their totals by at least 10 home runs in 1987, only one hit more homers in 1988. Bobby Bonilla of Pittsburgh slugged three out of the park in 1986, 15 in 1987, and 24 in 1988.

Darryl Strawberry of the Mets stayed at 39 homers last year.

Each of the remaining 17 regulars stroked an average of nearly 14 fewer four-baggers last season than they did the year before.




