Land approved for expansion

A 17-acre lot of land on the 300acre former Beardmore Tannery property has been approved for expansion by the Ministry of the Environment, says a Canada Packers spokesman.

J. Paul Wearing, the solicitor for Canada Packers spoke as a delegation at Monday's Halton Hills town council meeting. The town had asked for Ministry and Credit Valley Conservation Authority approval before the urban Acton property, described recently by Mayor Russ Miller as "contaminated" is given sewer hook-up.

Canada Packers has been given "unequivocal endorsement" by the MOE, said Mr. Wearing. He read to council a letter written by the ministry saying it would approve residential development on 17 acres of the Beardmore property.

"I take that letter to be an unequivocal endorsement," said Mr. Wearing Monday night.

Canada Packers went to the CVCA to amend its application for development. "We had two meetings with them in the last two weeks," said Mr. Wearing. But he added that the CVCA did not have time to submit a written statement endorsing Canada Packers' application.

Canada Packers would like to hold a meeting to get public input on the proposed expansion.

"We would very much welcome a public meeting," said Mr. Wearing. He said a meeting would help end the "confusion" caused by the application, which refers only to a 17-acre section of the total proper-

Acton Coun. Gerald Rennie said it was a "dangerous precedent" to have a proponent suggest a public meeting.

But town council will review the decision after it receives input from the Ministry of the Environment and the CVCA.


