

Escaped injury

Police say an Acton female, 16, escaped injury after the 1989 Ford she was driving struck a brick wall Sunday night.

Police say the car went out of control in a Peel Street, Acton, garage. No charges are laid in connection with the single-vehicle collision.

Loader missing

Halton Regional Police say a locked 1986 frontend loader backhoe valued at \$58,000 was stolen from a construction site located at Sideroad 5 and Trafalgar Road in Halton Hills sometime between the evening of May 19 and the early morning of May 23. Police say it is not uncommon for heavy construction equipment to disappear from construction sites.

Charges laid

Charges of impaired driving have been laid in connection with a car accident at Steeles Avenue and Trafalgar Road sometime during the evening of May 23. Police say a 35-year-old Acton man driving a 1978 GMC pick-up eastbound on Steeles Avenue failed to stop at the intersection stop lights and collided with a 1988 Ford tractor-trailer. No injuries resulted from the collision. A June 26 court date has been set.

Property recovered

I have decided to look out for a job this summer in the restaurant business. However, most of the places that I have visited have asked me to fill out an application form. I would appreciate it if you could tell me some of the most common information usually asked for in application forms and if at all they have any importance in being hired for the job.

What are applications?

Dear What,

Application forms are the key to very successful jobs. In fact, many employers decide from these forms whom they should call in for an interview. Thus, make sure that your application is neat, concise, and informative.

The main aspect of filling in an application form is to be prepared. Have all of the essential information ready and have a good idea what questions will be asked. Some of the most common questions that are frequently asked are:

-legal eligibility to work in Canada;

type of employment desired;alternate person to contact;

-previous salary and future salary desired;

—whether one has a driver's licence and what kind of transportation will be used;

work related experience;
 date that one is available to

begin working.

These and other similar questions reveal to the employer not only whether you will fill the practical aspects of the job but also whether you are genuinely interested in that particular field.

In sum, filling out an application properly can be the key to being successful in your summer job search. Remember that the application represents you to the employer. Don't let it intimidate you and use it to market yourself to the best possible advantage!

"It is constantly plagued by deep potholes and rust created by the heavy traffic flow emanating from Stewarttown School and Chantelay Crescent."

Mrs. Fantegrossi appeared before town council and staff Tuesday night, presenting the petition during a public meeting. Town staff said there was no money left


