- 1 pkg. lemon jelly powder
- 3/4 cup boiling water
- 1/2 cup sugar
- Juice and rind of one lemon
- 1 cup whipped cream
- 2 cups cooked, pre-sweetened rhubarb

Dissolve jelly powder in boiling water. Add sugar, lemon juice and grated rind. Chill until thickened.

Whip cream. Fold in rhubarb. Fold into jelly mixture. Spoon into baked shell and chill until firm.

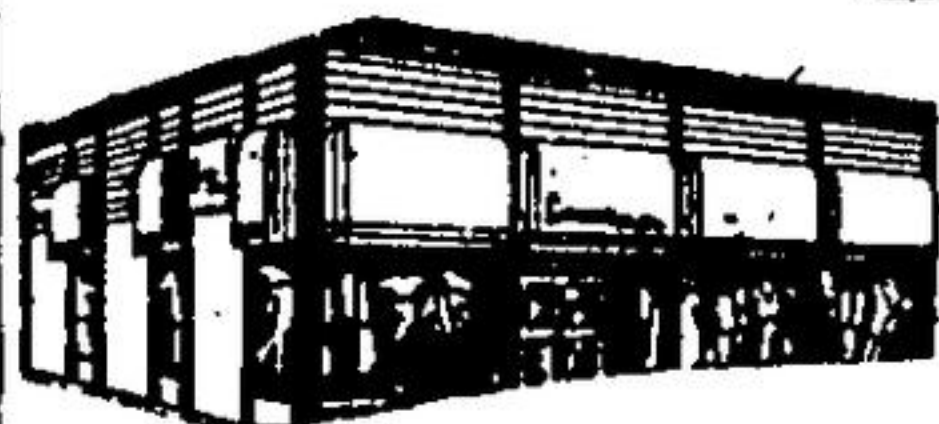

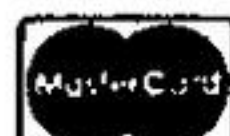

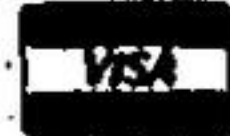
