Halton made \$9 million on investments last year

While other levels of government climb out of their deficit situations, the Region of Halton has made an almost \$9 million return on investments this year.

"Our cash management program has really taken off in the last five years," said Regional Treasurer and Finance Commissioner Joe Rinaldo.

Investment "has become a very important source of income for this Region," he said.

The Region kept roughly \$91 million invested in bank, government and trust company holdings. The figures fluctuated from the \$91-million figure to a peak of \$104 million last September.

The money made by the Region will improve services while reduc-

ing costs to taxpayers, Mr. Rinaldo said. This year's investment revenue is over \$1 million more than last year's total.

The investment strategy for the Region is low-risk. The Region takes a "careful" approach but "we attempt to diversify our portfolio as much as possible," said Mr. Rinaldo.

The Region's investments have been steadily increasing since the program was first begun. In 1980, the Region paid \$400,000 in deficit payments. Now it reduces debenture payments and is in a "very positive position," said Mr. Rinaldo.

The system has grown from "virtually nothing," to what it is now, he said.

Storm triggers alarms

The Halton Hills Fire Department says Thursday night's storm set off two false alarms in the Region. The first occurred at the Jack Smythe Field Study Centre in Terra Cotta. The second alarm went off at Kentner's Social Catering Limited on Mill Street in

Firefighters also responded to an earlier false alarm at Kentner's during the early morning of May 30. An alarm malfunction was cited as the cause.
