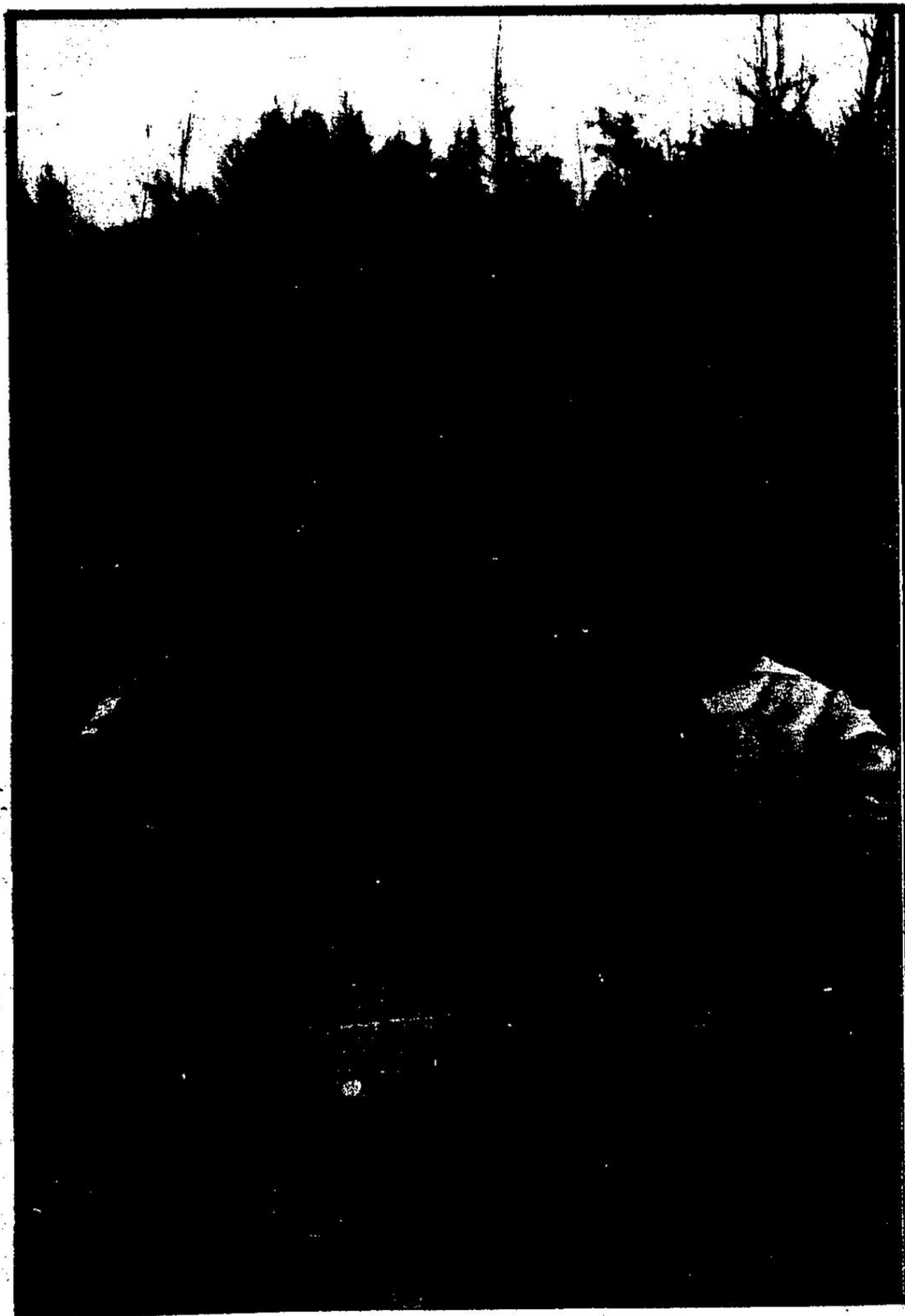

## Car accidents claim two lives

An Acton woman and Limehouse man died as a result of two separate car collisions occurring on Halton Hills roads late last week.

Halton Regional Police say Barbara Bonehill, 38, of Acton was killed when her southbound 1987 Ford collided with a northbound 1983 Dodge van on the Third Line south of Sideroad 22, Friday night.

Forty-three-year-old George Scholz died after his northbound 1985 Hyundai smashed into the rear end of a 1987 Mack tractor-trailer at the intersection of Highway 25 and Sideroad 5, Thursday night, the Ontario Provincial Police in Milton say.

Ms. Bonehill's daughter, Tanya Steffler, 14, as well as Nicole Whitfield, 13, and Kristine Fee, 13, both of Burlington, were taken by ambulance to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital, where they were treated for major injuries.

The van's driver, 20-year-old Acton resident Greg Landriault, was also taken by ambulance to Georgetown hospital and treated for major injuries. All have since been released.

Milton OPP report the driver of the tractor-trailer involved in the accident on Highway 25 and Sideroad 5, Toronto resident X.I. Led, 29, was treated at Milton District Hospital for a sore back.

Of the head-on collision occurring on the Third Line, Halton

Regional Police are only willing to say the two vehicles collided at the crest of a hill. An investigation into the incident is under way. It was reported however, that Ms. Bonehill was wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident.

Milton OPP say Mr. Scholz lost his life when he drove his vehicle into the tractor-trailer, that was waiting in the intersection, signalling to make a left-hand turn onto Sideroad 5.

Police say Mr. Scholz was not wearing a seat belt when the accident occurred.

No charges have been laid as a result of either of the accidents, police say.

Police report both locations are not accident-heavy areas. They do say, however, that whereas serious motor accidents are lower this year compared to this time last year, on regional roads, accidents are higher on provincial roads in Halton Hills.

## John McCauley remembered

Mr. McCauley, 44, died suddenly at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital Friday at 5:30 a.m. following complications from gall bladder surgery Thursday.

The Georgetown resident served as an NHL referee for 10 years before entering the upper echelon of the league's officiating hierarchy in 1980. He had been Director of Officiating since 1986.

In an NHL press release issued Friday, league president John A. Ziegler, Jr. said Mr. McCauley, "earned the respect and friendship of many - both in and outside the game."

Mr. McCauley is survived by his wife Irene, and children Wesley, 17, Bridget, 15 and Blaine, 13.
