



Herald Staff An Acton woman and Limehouse died as a result of two separate car collisions occurring on Halton Hills roads late last

Halton Regional Police say Barbara Bonehill, 38, of Acton was killed when her southbound 1987 Ford collided with a northbound 1983 Dodge van on the Third Line south of Sideroad 22, Friday night.

Forty-three-year-old George Scholz died after his northbound 1985 Hyundai smashed into the rear end of a 1987 Mack tractortrailer at the intersection of Highway 25 and Sideroad 5. Thursday night, the Ontario Provincial Police in Milton say.

Ms. Bonehill's daughter. Tanya Steffler, 14, as well as Nicole Whitfield, 13, and Kristine Fee, 13, both of Burlington, were taken by ambulance to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital, where they were treated for major injuries.

The van's driver, 20-year-old Acton resident Greg Landriault, was also taken by ambulance to Georgetown hospital and treated for major injuries. All have since been released.


A 100-year postal tradition at Terra Cotta will remain intact for at least the next 10 years.


