Market is needed for recycling efforts

Recycled garbage is a waste of time until there is a market for it, says Halton Regional Councillor Bill Johnson.

"You have to establish a market. If there's no market there (it's) going to go into the dump," he said to Regional councillors Wednesday.

The Region has been given a Ministry of the Environment mandate to raise their 16-per-cent level of recycling garbage to 25 per cent by 1992 and 50 per cent by the year 2000.

But Coun. Johnson said changes should be made in the system to expand the market for recycled garbage. No paper should be purchas-

ed unless it has a 40-per-cent recycled content. And "every school should have a composting facility," he said.

Coun. Johnson said food and beverage containers should be watched more closely. Soft drink cans should have a "legislated deposit" and soup cans should be foldable when the ends are removed.

While Coun. Johnson said the Ministry's aims to reduce garbage in landfill sites is "ambitious, unless this kind of legislation (to create a recycled goods market) is put forward, it's going to be one hell of a big problem," he said.

Green light for Silver Creek plan should come in the fall

It will be September before a "master plan" for 2,000 acres of Credit Valley Conservation Authority land gets the green light to amalgamate to one park property.

The CVCA, which has owned Silver Creek Conservation Area since the 1960s and the Terra Cotta Conservation Area since the 1970s, has been acquiring land between the two properties in the last several years, said CVCA general manager Vicki Barron. The CVCA intends to join the two conservation areas into one park.

The CVCA received preliminary approval for a plan which would be a "hybrid" scheme. The plan proposes to rehabilitate some of Terra Cotta's land while developing less environmentally-sensitive land for recreation.

"What we're looking at right now is dedicating four per cent of the property to what is called intensive recreation activity," said Ms. Barron. "The remainder of the property will be dedicated to and would encourage hiking."

The portion of the property that can tolerate recreation attracts 100,000 visitors a year. Ms. Barron said the CVCA scheme is to "refocus on what's popular. Because we haven't really done anything with (Terra Cotta) for 15 years," she said.

The CVCA board of directors agreed with the philosophy and with the "hybrid concept" of improvements at the proposed larger conservation area of Terra Cotta and Silver Creek, but will give final approval when the authority presents a master plan to be finished by September.

Terra Cotta was purchased by the CVCA in the 1960s to be used for parkland. The Silver Creek property was first attained to initiate flood control in the area, said Ms. Barron.

Ms. Barron said 11 municipalities, including Halton and Peel, will be affected by changes in the CVCA land north of

Georgetown and Norval. The municipalities, asking for their support, she said. CVCA will send information to all support, she said.
