Roger Haggett named new Hydro Commissioner

The Town of Halton Hills has selected a hydro-electric commissioner for Ward 1.

Roger Haggett, of Acton, will take over the spot vacated recently by the death of former

Hydro commissioner Doug Mason.

Town councillors held a special council meeting Monday night to appoint Mr. Haggett to his new position.

Walkway lights up to standard?

If at first you don't succeed, try, try again, was exercised by town staff after somebody apparently "screwed up" lighting at the Irwin and Dawson Crescents' walkway.

"In my opinion, somebody screwed it up," said Halton Hills Mayor Russ Miller. "Why are we stuck with some lights that are inappropriate?" he said to town councillors Monday night.

Lights were originally installed at the Georgetown walkway November 30, 1988 in response to complaints about vandalism and loitering made by surrounding neighbors. The three lights were 12-foot high and each was 150-watts.

But after receiving complaints that these lights were too bright, town staff disconnected two of the lights. It was then found that the one remaining light did not light up the walkway.

"Monies were budgeted to replace the three fixtures and lamps," says a staff report.

Three new fixtures, at 70 watts each, were ordered in April and installed May 9. These lights were mounted horizontally rather than vertically.

But a recommendation by town staff that the latest light system be used as a model for future walkways was rejected by town councillors Monday night.

"I'm inclined to think we should just accept it for the walkway and forget it," said Acton Coun. Gerald Rennie.

Coun. Norm Elliott said that while there should be a standard for future lighting "it doesn't have to be entrenched here in this recommendation."

"Trying to create a standard through this recommendation is the wrong way to go," he said.

But town engineer Bob Austin said he would like a standard approach to walkway lighting that

can be given to developers. And Mayor Russ Miller agreed: "There will be lighting in some of the walkways in the new developments. I would like to see us have a standard for the future."

There have been no complaints about the latest lighting system at the Irwin and Dawson Crescents' walkway.

"They're obviously satisfied because they're not saying anything," said Coun. Anne Currie.
