Viewing platforms set for Credit Forks

Construction of a series of viewing platforms along the Credit River Gorge in Forks of the Credit Provincial Park will continue this summer following approval of additional funding from the Ontario Heritage Foundation.


In 1988, the OHF awarded \$30,000 to the Ministry of Natural Resources, Maple District, to undertake the first phase of the project. The recent grant of \$30,700 will enable completion this summer,

Forks of the Credit Provincial Park is one of over 100 public parklands located on the Niagara Escarpment, from Queenston Heights to the recently created Fathom Five National Marine Park at the tip of the Bruce Peninsula.

The park includes mature forests, rolling meadows and scenic escarpment cliffs. Its most prominent feature is the Credit River which cascades past the remains of an historic mill and power dam.

The new viewing platforms will be adjacent to the Bruce Trail along the crest of the escarpment, offering visitors spectacular views of the waterfalls and Credit River Valley. Interpretive signs located on the platforms will highlight the special natural and historical features of the area.

The Ontario Heritage Foundation is an agency of the Ministry of Culture and Communications. It administers Ontario's Niagara Escarpment Trust Fund in cooperation with the Ministry of Natural Resources, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and the Niagara Escarpment Commission. The fund is used largely to acquire proper y for the Niagara parks system and for projects that will enhance public appreciation of the special resources of the Niagara Escarpment.


