On the 10-km side, Brian Lansdowne finished second overall in 36:14 ahead of third-place finisher Rick Lane, who clocked in at 36:23.

Guessing game begins for Bennett

It's pretty safe to say Saturday will be the most exciting day, so far, in the life of Georgetown's Adam Bennett.

Sometime during the morning the 18-year-old high school student will climb a podium at the Met Centre in Minneapolis, Minnesota and he'll don a National Hockey League jersey as a first round selection in the annual NHL entry draft.

Pretty heady stuff for a guy who two short years ago was slogging it out on the blueline with a struggling Georgetown Gemini

Jr. B squad. But then, the past two years have been the stuff of dreams for Bennett.

Last summer he was the number one pick, second overall, of the Ontario Hockey League's Sudbury Wolves. After a solid rookie season in the tough OHL wars where his stock rose with every outing, Bennett was soon ranked in the top 10 of eligible

players heading into the June 17

NHL lottery.

At last look, the affable youngster was ranked number seven in the world.

Now, the guessing game begins. What will be the next stop on Bennett's road to a professional hockey career?

According to the rangy Bennett (6-foot-4, 210-lbs.) it's all still up in the air.

There are, however, some

plausible scenarios that could unfold Saturday in Minnesota. Quebec, drafting first, has ap-

parently decided who they will select. But, they haven't ruled out a last-minute deal.

If Quebec does use their pick, it would have to be for one of two players - Swedish sensation Mats Sundin or Western League scoring machine Dave Chyzowski. Sandin isn't available for a year, but most experts feel the bulk of the 1989 draft crop are all at least a year away from the show.

So, if Quebec takes Sandin, the Islanders (at number two) would have to take Chyzowski. They have talked to Bennett, but they have a young defence now and need to replace Bryan Trottier SOOD.

The Leafs, at number three, apparently covet Belleville Bulls centre Scott Thornton.

leaves Winnipeg- drafting four and it's entirely possible Bennett could go that high to the Jets.

They wined and dined him a few weeks ago and they've picked extra large blueliners in the past, Jason Herter, a U.S. college product, is rated as the best defenceman in the draft but Bennett is considered to have the most potential. A toss-up?

"It comes down to what Winnipeg wants," says a philosophical Bennett. "If they are looking for the big defenceman I could go as early as fourth."

Winnipeg's also interviewed another highscoring WHL star, Stu Barnes, and if they deal Dale Hawerchuk, they may go up the middle.

That would leave Jersey, Chicago and Minnesota in that order. Bennett says his agent predicts he won't be around past the seventh pick.

'Jersey, Chicago and Minnesota are the kinds of teams I'd like to go to," said Bennett, who added he'll be happy anywhere. "I'd like to be part of a team on the way up."

A prediction from your humble typewriter jockey? Number six, Chicago.
