## United Way seeks business help

The United Way of Halton Hills has targeted a 61 per cent increase in business donations this year, to help bring the 1989 campaign goal to \$155,000.

The local United Way met last week at the North Halton Golf and Country Club in Georgetown for a breakfast meeting where 50 representatives from local business heard this year's campaign objectives.

The United Way surpassed last year's goal of \$130,000, largely through unprecedented success in special events fundraising to a total of \$22,500. The United Way expected \$8,000.

This year, the top four fundraising groups will be special events fundraising, commuter fundraising for those contributing outside Halton at \$35,500, residential funding which will increase as more rural areas are covered to a total of \$31,000, special events which should bring in \$28,000 in donations, and business which includes industry and commerce is hoped to bring in \$22,000. Business targets

have been increased by \$6,500 over last year's goal of \$13,500.

Weekly business donations would save the United Way some footwork, said president Arlene Bruce.

"As we move into payroll deduction, we can reduce the door-knocking," she said.

Mrs. Bruce added that people can easily give \$1 a week to an organization that serves 19 groups in the community. "People can throw a dollar into the pot for a lottery ticket each week," she said. "They can do the same to support organizations in their community."

"We're canvassing for money

for 19 organizations each year when we knock at the door," she said.

Statistics show that each family in Halton Hills uses the United Way services, which can be anything from local YMCA centres to the Red Cross, the Victorian Order of Nurses and Meals on Wheels.

"We don't have that next-door-neighbor, or that extended family providing support anymore," said Ms. Bruce.

The United Way takes their place in the community, she said.

The targeted increase in business donations should help the United Way reach the large work force in the community.

But Mr. Spicer said the town was not punctual in their assistance with the games. He said last week that hydro power was not operating Friday night and water expected to be turned on at 6 a.m. Saturday morning was late.

Town director of recreation and parks, Tom Shepard, said hydro "is not a town responsibility."

He said the water was forgotten by the town because of burials on Friday before the games, but that it was turned on Saturday morning at 7 a.m.

Mr. Shepard did not say that the town was to blame for garbage bags not available at the Fairgrounds site. While he didn't openly accept blame for some things apparently forgotten, he said, "we don't feel we had total co-operation from the Highland Games, either."

A loudspeaker at the Fairgrounds announced that the town was against the games, and that if they were to be saved for next year, people should phone Mayor Miller, said Mr. Shepard.

"I got a couple of letters that were nasty," said the mayor. "I tore them up and threw them away."

He said he also received phone calls.


"I worked very hard on this and was very disappointed at the comments I heard."

Acton Coun. Norm Elliott suggested the town and the Highland Games committee, should speak about the problems, to create "a better atmosphere for a harmonious arrangement of this festival next year."

"There were an awful lot of people at the Highland Games who said the town thumbed their noses at them. Some improvement has to be made in the way this particular organization approaches the town," he said.

But Georgetown Coun. Ann Currie said enough talking has been done about the Highland Games.

"Try and figure out what happened and get on with it," she said Monday.






