Interview is the key to getting the job

Considering all the steps in a job search, the interview is by far the most important. By actually showing how valuable you are to an employer, you can make up for any lack of experience or skills.

Here are a few tips to help you make the most of your interview.

1. Look your best. Employers sometimes make up their minds in the first 10 seconds whether they will hire you. It is important to present yourself in a clean, neat and conservative manner. For example, don't show up at a business office in jeans, it's a signal that says, "I didn't think that you were important enough to change my clothes." Remember that your clothes say as much about you as your resume.

2. Be prompt. Before your interview, find out where you have to go and how long it will take you to get there.

3. Have some background information. Try to find out before you arrive. This ensures that you will have the necessary background to ask intelligent questions at the interview. The library and personal connections are good sources of information in this area.

4. Be polite. A receptionist's impression of you could be the deciding factor in whether you are hired. When you actually meet the person who will be interviewing you, address him or her by name. Be sure to thank them for seeing you and extend a firm handshake. The maintenance of good eye contact shows that you are sincere and interested.

5. Be prepared for the question, "tell me about yourself." This is just one method of asking the potential employee why they

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should be hired. Impress upon the employer that you are eager, enthusiastic and have many skills which would benefit the organization.

6. After the interview is over. thank the person once more Chances are that you will not be offered the job on the spot so be sure to ask when the hiring will be done.

7. A thank you note is also to your advantage. It shows your interest and initiative. It also serves to remind the employer about your qualifications and should state that you hope to be hearing from them in the near future.

8. Keeping a journal of all your interviews, places where application letters were sent and-copies of your resume and reference letters is a good idea. Through being organized you will have a record of past places where you have been and also have the tools necessary to begin a job search in the future
