
Champlin croons TV's In the heat of the Night

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Author predicted Beijing massacre

Several days before last weekend's massacre began in Beijing, a Canadian author predicted the Chinese government would send in troops to break up the student protests in Tiananmen Square.

Chuck Konkel, a Toronto police sergeant, was in the U.S. promoting his novel, The Glorious East Wind, when he made his prediction on a number of U.S. radio stations.

Konkel, who served for more than three years on the Hong Kong police force in the 1970s and has visited Hong Kong a number of times since then, said the events unfolding in China are following a pattern.

the first student protesters were in the square, I was indicating the protests would be accepted for some time... then repressed by troops brought in from other provinces," Konkel said in a telephone interview. "I also said the protests could lead to civil war.

"The students were protesting corruption. Their talk of democracy was within the communist framework... The government didn't like the fact the students were acting autonomously... and publicly ridiculing them. The government felt it was losing control... and you cannot insult a very autocratic government."

Konkel, 38, whose novel, The Glorious East Wind, is set in Hong Kong in the 1990s - just before the British colony is to be turned over to Communist China - said some of the events unfolding in China, including the student protests, are similar to portions of his novel.

Konkel said he wasn't shocked by the massacre in Tiananmen Square, "but understanding what happened doesn't mean I condone


"What we are looking at right now in China is a cancer. To the Chinese government, the cancer is foreign influence. To us, obviously, the cancer is a mindset.

"As a westerner who lived in a Chinese society, I can understand why the government reacted the way it did."


The government, he said, is

"wantonly ignorant of what is happening in the world. Their biggest fright is that the system that has been built up since 1949 is breaking down."

Many of the Chinese leaders, he said, are looking to the past, not to the future.










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
