



# Residents will have to plug their ears

Those concerned with late-night noise at a construction site on Hall Road will have to keep their ears plugged until June 23, Halton Hills council decided Monday.

Acton Coun. Gerald Rennie said there has been "an ongoing problem" with the site at Hall Road. But town administrator Dan Costea said the construction company's work on the site "is such that they have to continue at night to complete a single (concrete) pour a day."

"The problem remains a problem but it is coming to an end," said Mr. Costea, who estimated the late-night construction noise at the site should stop around June 23.

Chief building official Ron Shettell said other high-rises have similar noise problems "but there's no one around to hear it."

The noise from the cement pouring comes from machines used,
said Mr. Shettell. "It's the whirring sound of the blades that we
hear," he said.
