No improvements for Scotsdale

Scotsdale Farm near Ballinafad will not get any major improvements until negotiations to lease the property to a Peel school board are settled.

Credit Valley Conservation Authority land resources manager Ken Owen recently wrote to the Town of Halton Hills to inform the town of what has happened to the farmland bequeathed the town by the Bennett family.

The Ontario Heritage Foundation and the Dufferin Peel Roman Catholic School Board have agreed "in principle" to enter into a lease agreement. The agreement would give the school board management responsibility, said Mr. Owen.

Until the contract is settled, the CVCA is "managing the property in a relatively low-key fashion."

"We are not carrying out any major renovations pending the outcome of the ongoing negotiations... substantial changes (should) be deferred until the long-term use of the property is determined," said

There are minor changes to the site, and the television series The Campbells, no longer films there, but "use of the property continues. to be in the same vein as has been the case for the past several

The Halton Board of Education voted earlier this year to apply for use of Scotsdale for school purposes, but the Ontario Heritage Foundation had already entered into negotiations with the Peel Catholic school board.

Consultant is a "hired gun" - Johnson

A consultant reviewing Halton's education and municipal systems in order to appeal to the government for increased funding was called "a hired gun" by one of Halton's Regional councillors.

Although all municipalities and Halton's two school boards agreed to kick in an extra \$4,000 each to fund an \$80,000 study to increase government funding to Halton, Milton Coun. Bill Johnson said he is "very disturbed" about paying for a consultant.

It's expensive and undemocratic "to get a hired gun to take our place at Queen's Park," said the councillor.

But Regional chief administrative officer John Fleming said the issue is not just funding, but includes how the Halton Board

of Education, The Halton Roman Catholic School Board, the Region of Halton, and Halton Hills, Milton, Oakville and Burlington "fit together..."

Public Affairs Management Incorporated, the firm conducting the study "is really described as a government relations consultant," said Mr. Fleming.

The consultant will cost the Region, the school boards and the municipalities over \$80,000. Halton Region previously agreed to pay \$30,000, which was to be half of an originally-proposed cost. But the Region recently asked the infrastructure review members to add another \$4,000 to their \$5,000 contributions.

The consultant's study is expected to being next week.
