





Picking the ultimate All-Star team

STAT SHEET



Why does the National League hold such a big edge in the All-Star Game? The NL has a 37-21 lead in the midsummer classic, which began in 1933. Even more impressive, it has won 26 of the last 31 games played to a decision (the second game in 1961 ended in a 1-1 tie).

Everyone has had his own explanation for the NL's All-Star success.

"I think the National League has better biorhythms in July," said Earl Weaver, former manager of the Baltimore Orioles.

Does the National League produce better players?

Yes, according to some experts. If so, it's possible that they have been simply outperforming their American League counterparts year after year.

Does the record show that NL players have turned in the top career performances in All-Star Games? Let's

Take batting averages, instance.

Here are the players with the highest career batting averages in All-Star Game competition (based on a minimum of 15 at bats):

First base - Steve Garvey (.393);

second base - Charlie Gehringer (.500); shortstop - Arky Vaughan (.364); third base - Stan Hack (.400); outfield - Enos Slaughter (.381), Dave Winfield (.361), Dom DiMaggio (.353); and catcher — Johnny Bench

Five of the eight position players (Garvey, Vaughan, Hack, Slaughter and Bench) performed for National League squads; two (Gehringer and DiMaggio) for American League teams; and one (Winfield) for both leagues.

But suppose we try to pick a team of "all-time" All-Star performers.

Here is one man's "ultimate" team based on career performances only in All-Star games:

· First base: Steve Garvey (NL). Jimmle Foxx gives Garvey his biggest competition. But Garvey leads in extra base hits (6) in All-Star games - as well as in RBIs (7). Ted Kluszewski and Bill Skowron also show well. But they still fall short of Garvey.

· Second base: Charlie Gehringer (AL). There is strong competition at the keystone sack. Nellie Fox, Billy Herman and Jackie Robinson all hit well above .300 in All-Star games. "The Mechanical Man" gets the nod, however. Gehringer's .500 average (10 hits in 20 at bats) is the highest compiled by any player in the history of All-Star competition.

9 Shortstop: Arky Vaughan (NL). He edges Ernie Banks based on a higher batting average (.364 to .303) and similar power figures in just over half as many All-Star games (7 to 13 appearances).

. Third base: Brooks Robinson (AL). George Brett, Harmon Killebrew, Ron Santo and Ken Boyer all get

votes. But when offense and defense are combined, the All-Star winner is Robinson - .289, four extra base hits (including a record-tying three triples) and five RBIs.

· Outfielders: Willie Mays (NL), Stan Musiai (NL), Ted Williams (AL). A real dogfight exists in the outfield. But the vote from this quarter is: Mays, Musial and Williams. Among them, they hold career All-Star marks for most games (Mays, Musial - 24), runs (Mays - 20), hits (Mays - 23), home runs (Musial - 6), extra base hits (Mays, Musial - 8), total bases (Mays, Musial -- 40), runs batted in (Williams - 12), bases on balls (Williams -- 11) and stolen bases (Mays - 6).

 Catcher: Johnny Bench (NL). Johnny Bench's .357 average, three home runs and six RBIs give him catching honors ahead of Gary Carter, Walker Cooper, Ernie Lombardi and Bill Dickey.

· Pitcher: Mel Harder (AL). Although Lefty Gomez is the only hurler to win three All-Star contests, the choice is Harder of the Clevleand Indians. He is the only hurler with 10 or more innings pitched in All-Star games who did not give up a single run. He surrendered only nine hits and one base on balls in 13 innings of action in four games while compiling a 1-0 record. Bob Feller, Ewell Blackwell, Don Drysdale and Juan Marichal each rate honorable mention.

To manage these all-time All-Stars, we turn to Walter Alston of the National League. "Smokey" won a record seven mid-season classics against only two losses. Casey Stengel of the American League, with four wins in an All-Star record 10 appearances, is runner-up.


