Remember that the prime quarry was smallmouth bass, and experienced anglers know how these bronze battlers love to invade the shallows and the areas

Equipment should be kept simple. Hook and worm, or leech, at the end of your most familiar, easy handling gear will do the trick.

Remember a flashlight, lots of anti-bug juice, and a little radio to keep you company.
