
Some things spring to mind immediately. A number of stores are beginning to stock and advertise a wide variety of environmentally-safe cleansers, phosphate-free detergents, and bio-degradable soaps. These are products that won't strain the septic system, feed the algae in the lake or foam up all over the neighbour's beach. And even if there's a box already under the cottage sink, a second one will never go to waste.

A pack of photo-degradable garbage bags (bags that will break down in sunlight) might make things a little easier at the local landfill site. However, a portable recycling bin with a tight lid, for carrying bottles and cans and newspapers back to the city (and its recycling truck) each Sunday, may make an even better gift.

A package of wildflower seed mix might be appreciated by the cottager who doesn't want to spend every weekend slaving over a lawn that looks like a billiard table or a golf green. Leave enough grass for a game of badminton or croquet, and seed the rest with flowers or low growing ground cover. Then sit back, forget about mowing and weeding and watering, and watch the birds.

And while we're still talking about plants, some gardeners claim certain plants can repel some furry garden raiders. The odour of nasturtiums, for instance, is reputed to be offensive to woodchucks and rabbits (while still attracting humming-birds). The leaves are supposed to make a tasty salad, too. In the same vein, deer don't like fox-gloves, moles don't favour cas-

SEKENNEDY RD. BRAMPTON 456-0971 tor plants, and rabbits will avoid the dusty miller ornamental. We can't guarantee they'll work, but everybody remembers a guest bearing flowers.

There's a growing demand for the so-called natural pest control products, such as diatomaceous earth (a nontoxic abrasive that literally punches holes in bugs' hard shells) and a number of pest control soaps. However, some of the most effective pest killers are other bugs. A praying mantis or a box of ladybugs or lace wing flies will eat their weight in aphids or other insect pests everyday. That's an unusual gift that keeps on giving.

If your hosts' garden is being ravaged by larger varmints - raccoons or possums or groundhogs - and you can persuade them to evict rather than exterminate, perhaps a live-release trap would be welcomed. Bait the trap - they come in all sizes, from chipmunk to bear-size with a suitable delicacy and when the spring's sprung, deport the unwelcome guest a few miles down the road. Unfortunately, live traps are not recommended for uninvited visitors of the human variety.

For the fisherman, a copy of the Ministry of Environment's 1989 Guide to Eating Ontario





Call Margaret 873-2165 Sport Fish, along with a good fish identification guide, could hit the spot. Or how about a package of barbless hooks, to make it easier to release the fish you don't plan to eat anyway, and a pair of long-handled fish pliers to remove lures quickly and easily, without manhandling the fish too long.

How about a simple acid rain test kit for measuring the local impacts of this major pollution problem? Or a water sampling

kit for collecting clean samples for analysis by the local Public Health Laboratory? The Ontario Ministry of Environment also publishes a very useful (and free) environmental manual for cottagers, titled Cottage Country, that might round out the package nicely.

The greatest weapon against pollution is awareness. Environmental damage can be a slow,
