

Old beach open at Fairy Lake

Seven beaches in Halton Region, including ones at Fairy Lake in Acton and Kelso, are closed on this weekend - described by an Environment Canada official as a "perfect weekend."

The old beach at Fairy Lake, which offers supervised swimming, has been given the Regional okay for safe bacteria counts. Halton warns swimmers against using the new beach area.

Kelso Park beach in Milton was closed as of Thursday but a report was expected to come out yesterday (Friday) that could allow swimming for the weekend.

Five beaches in Oakville and Burlington have high counts of faecal chloriform (the substance

found in the stomachs of warm-blooded animals) and should not be used for swimming this week. The Lake Ontario beaches with high bacterial counts are Sioux Lookout, Bronte Park East, Coronation Parks East and West and Dingle Park in Oakville.

Weathermen predict sunshine and warm temperatures this weekend. For Saturday and Sunday, there will be high temperatures of 24 degrees Celcius and low temperatures of 12 degrees Celcius. The humidity was supposed to almost disappear after Thursday afternoon's thunder shower.

Monday will be warmer with a high of 26 degrees Celcius.
