Lockwood sets game scoring standard

Play resumed Sunday, after a week's layoff, in the Georgetown Men's Flag Football League and the rest may have done the previously lurching Dairy Queen crew's offence a world of good as the defending league champions thumped an outmanned and disorganized M and M outfit, 50-5

Gary Lockwood once again piloted the Dairy Queen offensive gunners by scoring 34 points - a new league record for individual single game scoring.

In other tilts, Corrigan had an easy time disposing of Plus Welding, 35-12; Kerry Kitchens humbled a strangely flat Glen squad, 27-9 and the Longhorns toyed with Muscle Works before coming out on top, 27-6.

Lookwood counted 20 first half points against M and M, on three touchdowns and a two-point convert as the red and white team built up a 34-0 first half lead.

He added 14 more second half points on two touchdowns and a two-point convert to set the new league single game scoring standard.

Lockwood's 34 point output allowed him to move into first place in the league's scoring derby ahead of Longhorns Gary

Hulbert. Ironically, the league's old single-game scoring record of 28 points, was set by Longhorn's, Jim Lindsay several years ago against Dairy Queen.

Hal Hulme scored six points on a nice interception return. Howie Hulme scored a major, Randy Lunn had a two-point convert and Steve-"Grizzly" Crossman collected a two-point convert to round out the winners' scoring.

The Plus Welding defence was baffled all game by the Corrigan passing attack, orchestrated by strong-armed quarterback, Pat McKinnon.

Corrigan led 23-6 at the half then coasted to the 35-12 win.

Al Pelland, proving to be a threat to score every time he gets his hands on the ball, scored 18 points for Corrigan. Brad Ferguson played as other strong oftensive adding three points on a field goal.




