Hockey school ready to go

It's all systems go and all openings have been filled for the hockey school which will run from Aug. 28 to Sept. 1 at Georgetown's Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena.

Hockey School operators, Dave Krause and Al Hay, want to ensure that area youngsters have the opportunity to attend a locally-run hockey school, minute applications.

The school, operated through Halton Hills Sports Operations, is expected to attract approximately 90 skaters ranging in age from 7 through 13. The youngsters will in turn be divided into Novice, Pee Wee and Atom age groups.

The week-long school will run from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily and offers a variety of programs.

There will be two-a-day on-ice sessions, video and instructional film sessions, daily dryland training sessions and a once-a-day general sports session.

According to Hay and Krause, there will be three instructors on

the ice at all times handling groups of no larger than 30 skaters.

Instructors signed on so far include, local product, Steve Marcolini who skated for Kitchener's Junior "A" Rangers, as well as St. Francis Xavier university; Curtis Green, former Georgetown Pontiac-Buick Raider netminder, who will be attending the training camp of the Junior "A" Owen Sound Platers and Greg Souca, powerskating instructor for the Town of Halton Hills.

A personal performance evaluation will be done on each skater and as well, all those attending the school will receive a Certificate of Achievement.

The school's wrap-up day, Sept. 1, will feature games for all age groups.

The cost for the school has been set at \$130.00. Hot lunches can be made available to youngsters at an additional cost.
