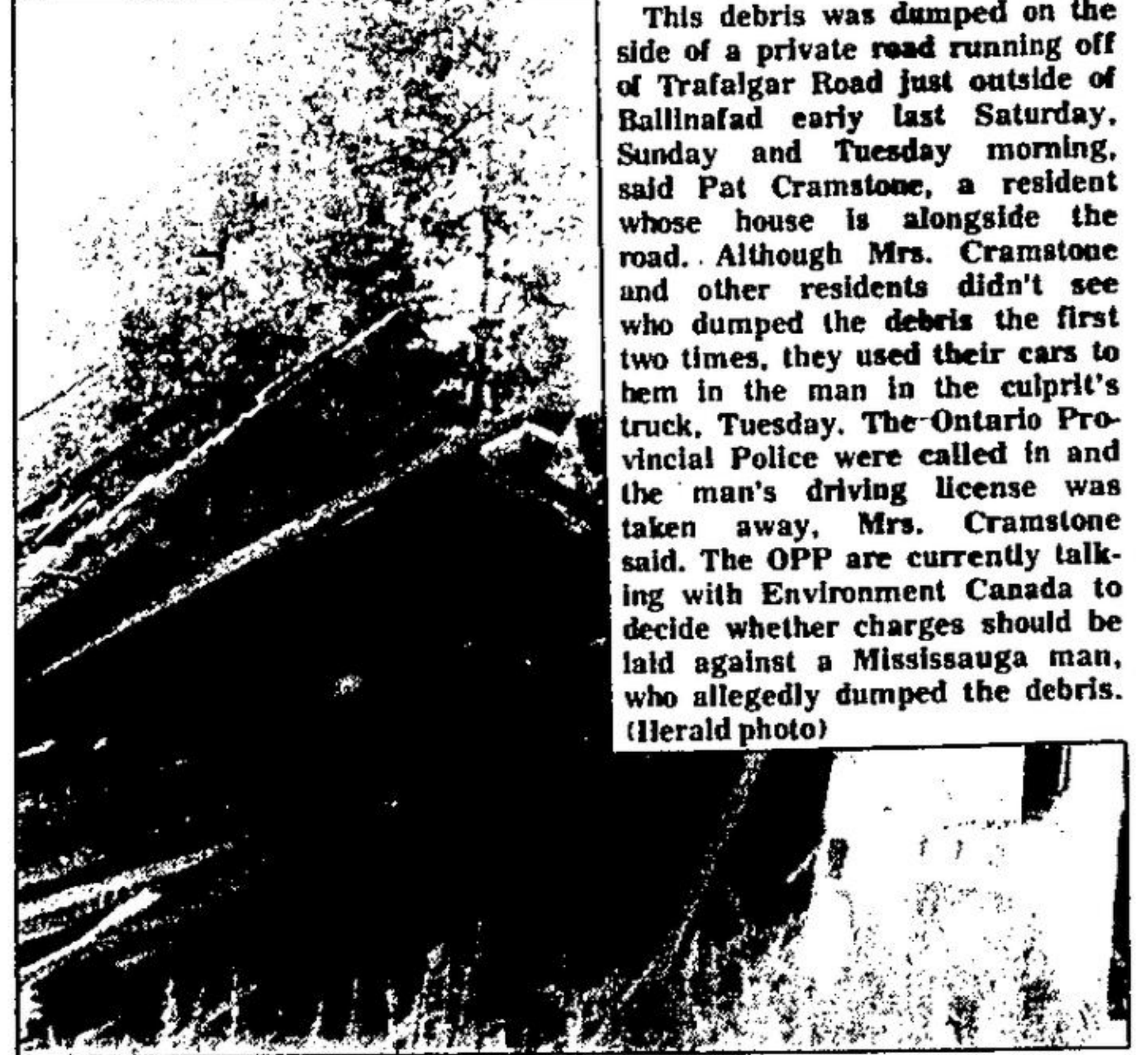




### Warrior's Day at CNE.

## Water contamination only in Milton hospital

Halton Region's medical officer of health said Wednesday that the water contamination in Milton is restricted to the Milton District Hospital.

Dr. Graham Pollett responded to Milton Mayor Gord Krantz and Milton Coun. Brad Clements, who said nearby residences were also receiving water high in bacterial counts.

"There is a contamination of the water supply, but as far as we can tell, it is restricted to the hospital," Dr. Pollett said.

"The test done on homes hasn't shown the amount of contamina-

tion the hospital has."

But Mayor Krantz said there is a small section of Milton identified as having high levels of fecal coliform in the water. Coun. Clements added that there are a number of houses on the same water pipeline as the hospital. There are "a minimum number of homes that have been affected," he said.

The cause of the water contamination was said to be a dead bird caught in one of the pipes. A second pipe was being investigated.

## Miss Canada Preliminaries to come to Club 2000

One of the 10 Miss World Canada Competition preliminary rounds will be held at Norval's Club 2000 the nights of Aug. 31, Sept. 9 and Sept. 14. The other nine will be held at clubs across the country.

Over the three nights, two or three finalists will be chosen to compete in the preliminary finals held Sept. 21 at the club, its general manager John Fisher said. The winner of the competition will be flown to Edmonton Sept. 29 to compete in the Miss World Canada Competition.

All proceeds raised from the Miss World Canada Competition will go to support the work of the Variety Club of Canada.

The event is sponsored by Casio Canada in association with JPL International Inc., Mr. Fisher said.

Mr. Fisher expects 12 to 15 contestants each night. The contestants will be judged in three categories, aerobic wear, swim wear and evening wear, he said.

There will be five different judges each night of the competition, Mr. Fisher said. They will be local business representatives, radio personalities, modelling agency representatives and beauty and fashion experts, he said.

All contestants must be between the age of 18 and 24, have never been married, have never given birth, usually go by the prefix of Miss, be a Canadian citizen or landed immigrant and be available to take three weeks off to participate in the Miss Canada World Canada Competition in Edmonton and the Miss World Competition in England.

About 500 people are expected to attend each night of the competition held at the club, he said.

## Town land sold

The price of the land was delayed until last Monday's council meeting where Acton Coun. Norm Elliott asked his colleagues to be sympathetic with Mr. Sheppard.

"The amount is excessive," Coun. Elliott said. "I don't think the (market value) explanation or the rationale is realistic."

Georgetown Coun. Ann Currie said Mr. Sheppard was not being treated fairly by the town.
