Father David, who works in the Solicitor-General's offices in Toronto and mother Debbie, a teacher's assistant at Stewarttown School, don't spend much time these days in their Marilyn Crescent home. With sports-minded oungsters like son Duane and daughter Darby on the go, it helps to re-introduce the family to the household dog, now and then to avoid teeth marks.

Twelve-year-old Duane, who will be entering Grade 8 this fall at Centennial School, is concentrating on golf this summer and is repidly gaining a name for himself in provincial junior golf circles.

He competes in the 1989 Accuform Junior Golf Tour and has made his mark.

He is the youngest golfer on the Tour and at 4'10" and 90 lbs., also has the distinction of being the smallest competitor.

The Accuform Junior Golf Tour is open to Hamilton-wentworth and Halton Region golfers under 18 as of Sept. 1.

He qualified to compete on this year's Tour by shooting an 87 in a qualifying round held at Burlington's Tyandago Golf course. Only 45 spots were open and a field of 100 young golfers were vying for entry.

Duane recently took part in the Ontario Golf Association's school at Camp Borden, near Barrie. The purpose of the sch ool is to identify promising young golfers and aspects of their game which can be worked on.


He placed 24th at the Ontario Bantam Golf Championships, for players 13 years of age and under, staged in Leamington and in Junior Invitational competition, was runner-up in a tournament played at Golf Haven in St. Catharines; placed sixth in a tournament held at Wyldewood and finished fourth in a tourney staged in Dundas Valley.

Duane admits he's 'hooked' on the game and spends as much time on the links - usually with his father - as he can spare.

He plays House League Soccer and was a member of the Pee Wee Select team that won the Consolation Championship at a tourna-


