Mischief charges

Halton Regional Police laid charges of mischief after a 19-year-old Georgetown woman threw a rock at a Main Street North home in Acton causing \$50 damage early Sunday afternoon. Police say the woman appeared to be having an argument with a man in the house when the incident occurred. A Sept. 25 court date has been scheduled.

Charges laid

Charges of dangerous operation of a motor vehicle were laid following the arrest of a 19-year-old Brampton man last Wednesday in connection with a traffic accident in the area of Sideroad 22 and the Third Line during the middle of last month. A Sept. 18 court date has been scheduled.

Wallet stolen

A wallet containing \$310 in cash was stolen from an unlocked 1986 Ford parked in the parking lot at 300 Guelph St. in Georgetown last Thursday evening.

\$400 damage

Police say \$400 damage was caused to four wooden guard posts in the area of the Sixth Line south of Steeles Avenue in Halton Hills when a car struck them sometime during the past two weeks. Witnesses told police the driver sped off following the collision.

Briefcase stolen

Police say a briefcase containing approximately \$350 worth of computer discs, pens and paper were stolen from an unlocked vehicle parked outside a Raylawn Crescent residence overnight Aug. 27.

\$190 damage

Someone caused \$190 damage to the rear light panel bar cover of a

1984 Camaro parked in the Kingham Road area of Acton overnight Aug. 26, police say.

\$600 damage

Approximately \$600 damage was caused to the left quarter-panel of a 1988 Toyota when another vehicle collided with it while parked in the area of Delrex Boulevard in Georgetown sometime between 1 p.m. and 11 p.m. Saturday, police say. The culprit drove away immediately following the accident.

Window smashed

Police report someone smashed a window at the Acton Halton Hills Hydro office on Alice Street causing \$250 damage, overnight Aug. 26. The object used is still unknown, police say.

Impaired charges

Police laid charges of impaired driving after they found a 44-year-old Mississauga man behind the wheel with the keys in the ignition of a car parked in a Delrex Boulevard and Mountainview Road South parking lot late Sunday night. A Sept. 28 court date has been scheduled.

Two-car collision

Charges of failure to remain at an accident were laid following a two-car collision on the Fifth Line near Steeles Avenue in Halton Hills Saturday night, police say. A 21-year-old Mississauga man was allegedly driving along the Fifth Line when he stopped the car and proceeded to back into a parked car. The man is set to appear in court Oct. 10 in connection with the incident.

Georgetown police station to expand

Halton Regional Police will get an extra \$14,000 from the Region to help fund an expansion project in Georgetown.

The board of police commissioners applied to Halton Region to get an increase from a budget allocation of \$258,000 to \$272,000 to build a security garage and a meeting room at the 11 Division precinct on Guelph Street.

The proposed expansion of the police station will be added to the south of the building, at the main entrance on Guelph Street.

A security garage on the premises will guard against escaping or violent prisoners.

"You drive in with your prisoner and there is a camera that monitors your entrance," said 11 Division Georgetown Sgt. David Pruitt. Hallways in the police station are already monitored by camera.

"Once the (garage) bay comes down, the setting is controlled and monitored.

"So, if there is an altercation or there is an escape attempt, it's going to be complicated" for the prisoner, Sgt. Pruitt said.

The security garage is a "pro-active" measure, rather than a reaction to violent outbreaks or escape attempts, Sgt. Pruitt said.

Security garages are not "high tech" and are "not sophisticated equipment," the sergeant said. The Burlington and Oakville

precincts already have security garages.

The meeting room to be built at the Guelph Street police station will be used by both the ratepayers and police, Sgt. Pruitt said.

"Citizens can use the room for formal and semi formal meetings and functions." Police Act trials and swearing-in ceremonies are held at a similar 100-seat facility in Burlington called the Skerrett Room, named after former police chief Ken Skerrett.

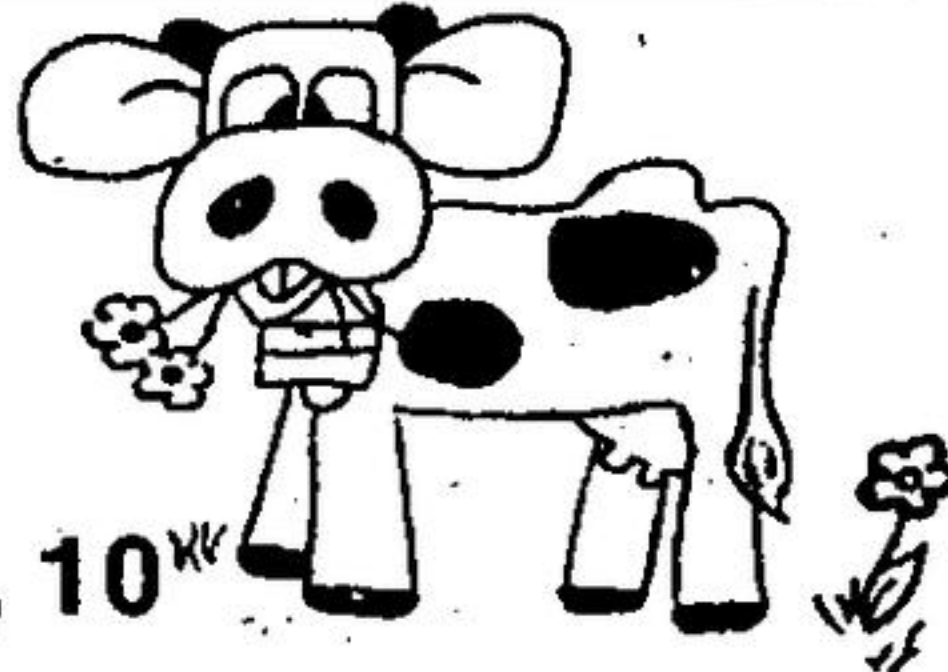

Back hoe stolen from Milton site

Investigators of the Milton Division of the Halton Regional Police are requesting assistance from the public for information on the theft of a Case back hoe from a construction site at 3104 Lower Base Line, Milton.

The victim in this theft was installing a cellular tower at 3104 Lower Base Line. On Friday, Aug. 11, 1989 at 3 p.m., the victim completed work for the day and left the back hoe on the property. The property is fenced, however the gate was unlocked. The victim returned to the job site on Thursday, Aug. 17 and discovered the back hoe missing.

A witness advises that on Saturday, Aug. 12 he observed a male driving the missing back hoe from the construction site onto Lower Base Line. The back hoe was then loaded onto a yellow trailer attached to a dark brown dump truck. The suspect vehicle

then drove westbound on Lower Base Line.

The stolen construction equipment is described as a 1985 Case back hoe with loader bucket on front of the vehicle, model 580E, orange in color. Valued at \$40,000.
