
Homeruns in the game were bashed by Bart Balanowski, Matt Walinga, Ricky Hume and Chris Collie. Chris Collie had five RBIs.



In other regular season-ending games, Longhorns throttled Plus Welding, 39-0; Muscle Works surprised Oldtimers, 22-13 and Corrigan easily outplayed the Glen, 36-10.

Official league records weren't kept during the formative years of the Men's Flag loop, but Dairy Queen gridders felt certain that if the team had prevailed over Karry. Kitchens it would mark the first time a team had gone undefeated in regular-season play.

The on-again-off-again DQ offence sputtered again and that combined with a surprisingly tenacious Karry Kitchens defence and strong leadership from quarterback and team captain, Doug Pembleton, allowed the Kitchens crew to carry the day.
