I recall watching an NFL game with Roman, and marvelling at his grasp of North American football. He, in turn, was quite impressed with how I picked up on the rather unusual spelling of his Polish surname. I told him that it wasn't too difficult for someone whose mother's maiden hame was pronounced "Jay-jik", and spelled "dziedzic."

The years have gone by quickly since that night, and, for Roman, the often-threatened retirement became reality in late June. I'll always remember his happy, well-tanned face, wrinkled with wit and

wisdom, as he sat at a makeshift table in the X-ray department, enjoying a farewell dinner with his radiology colleagues.

"Kind of like the Last Supper," someone remarked, and we laugh-

Indeed, the words were sadly prophetic.

Roman was found in his apartment, less than a week into his retirement. He had passed away just before what would have been his 67th birthday.

We miss you, Roman, old friend, but I have this funny feeling that your're enjoying it where you are now, teaching the big fellow that famous backhand tennis shot of yours, and tormenting Him with some of those oh-so-bad stories and jokes.

Take care, old friend, and put a good word in for us when you have a minute, when you finish that tale. Some of us need all the help we can get...




