The award recipient from Acton High School will be selected during the month of September.

Two \$100 awards will be given to students enrolled in the Adult Learner program. A decision has not yet been made.

Rosina Cibic was chosen to receive the \$350 Mature Student award, and from Bishop Reding High School, \$50 Proficiency Awards were given to two Grade 11 students: Daniel Fratnik and Nicole Remedios.

Throughout the year, the UWC presents an interesting program of monthly meetings, generally held at Centennial School in Georgetown.
