

Acton fair Queen crowned this Friday

The annual three-day extravaganza at Prospect Park gets under way this Friday as the Acton Agricultural Society puts on the 76th version of the Acton Fall Fair.

The annual fair gets under way this Friday night at the Acton Arena with the crowning of Miss Acton.

For those interested in another form of perfection there is the horse-pulling scheduled for the same night.

The fair's parade committee chairman, George Henderson, hopes this year's attendance will surpass last year's of 10,000. Organizers are busy completing final preparations this week for Friday's opening.

Saturday's festivities get under way at 8 a.m. and go well into the evening. Highlights include the cattle, heavy and light horse, and sheep shows, the all-terrain vehi-

cle pulling contest, a dance and the fair parade.

Starting at noon people will be able to see a variety of floats sponsored by groups including the Acton Branch of the Canadian Cancer Society, the Acton Figure Skating Club and the Acton Christian Reform Cadets, marching bands from Arthur and Guelph, the Ontario and Halton Furrow Queens, the Ontario Dairy Princess and Miss Acton herself as the parade winds through Acton from McKenzie-Smith Middle School to Prospect Park.

Sunday, is dairy day at the fair. Festivities will start at 12 noon and they include tractor and truck pulls, remote control races for the children and western square dancing during the evening.

20 thefts solved

Over 20 reports of thefts from vehicles occurring this summer can now be cleared after police laid charges of theft and possession of stolen property, Saturday morning.

Police report someone broke into a 1985 Hyundai, parked on Charles Street in Georgetown and stole a pair of sunglasses and a flashlight early Saturday morning. The stolen property is valued at \$50.

Police laid charges of causing a disturbance after a 19-year-old Georgetown man was pushed through the window of a Mountainview Road South video store early Sunday morning. Satanic phrases in Oakville

Satanic symbols and phrases are involved with a rash of vandalism taking place in the Glen Abby area of Oakville.

Halton Regional Police in Oakville are investigating a number of complaints of property damage where satanic symbols and phrases have been spray painted on garage doors, fences, parked vehicles and super mail boxes.

The areas involved are located on Greendale Terrace, Greenbriar Drive, Beechgrove Crescent and Heathfield Crescent. The nature of the vandalism is satanic with the properties being defaced by the Pentacles, swastika crosses, the number "666" or the phrase "Death to the Pigs" being sprayed on cars, doors, fences and mail boxes.

Investigating officers have recovered the automobile paint spray cans used by the suspects. The colors used were red, white lacquer and a brown primer. Fingerprint lifts have been obtained from the paint cans.
