
Jeff Lockwood played a strong game both offensively and defensively for the 35-10 winners.

Hal Hulme had 12 points for Dairy Queen and also notched an interception. Hugo Dittfach rounded out the DQ scoring.


Frank Bruno donned playing togs for the first time in three years for the Oldtimers and made his presence felt.

Playoff challenges




