In January, 1990, Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) premiums will be replaced by the new

EMPLOYER HEALTH TAX (EHT).

All employers with permanent establishments in Ontario will be required to pay this tax through monthly or quarterly instalments based on total calendar year gross payroll.

THE ONTARIO MINISTRY OF REVENUE

which is responsible for administering this new tax, mailed an INFORMATION REQUEST to Ontario employers on August 28, 1989. Information provided by employers to the Ministry will be used to determine if tax is payable. As well, the Ministry will send employers further information as it becomes available.

Acton Fair draws 14,000 people

Although it literally "rained on their parade," Acton Fall Fair organizers say this year's fair was a success.

With the exception of a poor showing of entrants in the heavy and light horse shows and the cancellation of the All Terrain Vehicle Pull Contest, both due to rain on Saturday, all events went ahead as planned, the fair's president Chris Hanskuechler said.

Attendance was down 15 per cent from last year's total of 15,000, Mr. Hanskuechler said, but considering the rain that number is good.

The fair's parade committee chairman, George Henderson, added last year's total was an attendance record so regardless of the weather it would have been tough to surpass.

Area residents and others from farther away attended the three-day event, Mr. Hanskuechler said.

The "Free Friday for School Children" was a fair highlight, said Mr. Hanskuechler.

School children were invited Friday to visit Prospect Park with their class and see several displays including arts and crafts, a lama and other animals, and a fire department and ambulance service demonstration. The schools are really in favor of the event, Mr. Hanskuechler said. It was introduced last year and expanded this time, he added.

Other popular events were Cowboy Black Bart who took on all quick-draw challengers, the truck and antique tractor pulls, and the cattle shows, Mr. Hanskuechler said.

The fair opened Friday night with the crowning of Miss Acton, who this year is Karin Pfahler, Jean McDonald and Donna Vanderheyden placed second and third respectively.

Despite Saturday's rain participation was excellent in the fair's parade, Mr. Henderson said. The Acton Figure Skating Club had the winning float. Other recognized floats were sponsored by the Protect Our Water and Environmental Resources (POWER) group and the Acton Legion Ladies.

Although the fair has just ended for many it is just beginning for others. Organizers have already started making plans for next year. But specific events won't be determined until a new president is elected, Mr. Hanskuechler said.

But the goal will always be to put on events that appeal to as many people as possible, he said.
