In just a few days, I'm back to Ottawa. It's hard to believe that the summer has melted away so quickly, or that so much has happened over the past couple of months. Let me give you a taste of what life has dished me in the past 11 weeks.

-Finance Minister Mike Wilson unveiled details of his nine per cent Goods and Services Tax, which has resulted in a national debate about the economy and taxes and the future. Wilson and his staff have been in touch with me often, and I have told them that I think some changes are needed - like lowering the rate, cutting out some exemptions and making sure consumers are protected.

By this time you should have received the 20-page guide to the new tax which I wrote. It's an attempt to explain the changes, not sell them to you - and I hope you take the time to fill in the response sheet included in that guide. Tell me what you think, so I can tell the feds.

—We held seven Town Hall meetings across this big riding of Halton-Peel, in Brookville, Acton, Burlington, Terra Cotta, Norval, Belfountain and Palgrave. It was not easy for me, standing up before crowds of people after Ottawa had announced a new tax - but I know it was the right thing to do. Personally, I learned a lot. And I thank the citizens and taxpayers who came out to talk to me.

-Still on the GST, the Halton-Peel Tax Committee has been studying the proposals that Wilson came out with, and will be making a submission to the House of Commons finance committee. This group of people is made up of accountants and small business operators from across our area,

and I very much value their advice.

The committee will be holding two public meetings on the tax changes, before it writes its report. If you'd like to get on record, then please attend - 7 p.m. Sept. 26 at the community centre in Bolton; Sept. 28 at the Cultural Centre in Georgetown. I'll be in Ottawa those nights, so chairman Colin MacKinnon will be in charge.

-I've been in the Maritimes on three occasions this summer twice at the request of the prime minister, and this last time because Wilson asked me to go. I went through rural Nova Scotia, listening to the thoughts of people there; then to Prince Edward Island, where I learned what the planned closure of CFB Summerside would mean to the local economy. Both trips taught me a lot about how other Canadians are feeling.

Over the past three days I've been in Nova Scotia again, and New Brunswick - this time holding Atlantic versions of the Town Hall meetings we had here.

—Well, the Halton-Peel Environment Committee is up and running, and we had some great meetings over the summer. There are more than 60 people on this volunteer committee, and when we get together the air is thick with ideas.

We've broken into a number of working groups, with the clear intention of accomplishing some tangible good. It's one thing to talk about helping the environment, and another to actually do it. This time, we plan to be doers - from educational programs in schools to recycling displays in shopping malls to planting trees and drafting new legislation.

-Dorothy and I have enjoyed being at dozens of community events over the past few weeks. We've been to fall fairs, and the opening of new facilities and anniversary parties. We've been on the road from Highway 9 in the north to the QEW in the south.

The days have been full, meeting with dairy farmers and business people and school kids. Politics is hard, but it brings me into contact with so many people - and that can't help but make life fuller.

while. We'll be home every few days, of course, and you can always reach me through the office in Georgetown. This session of Parliament is going to be rough, as we talk about tax reform, abortion, government spending, privatizing Canada Post and a host of other issues.

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
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


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
