Shady Ladies take title

The 1989 Georgetown Ladies Pewderpuff Softball League season came to a final - and fitting conclusion Sunday at the Fairgrounds, with Shady Ladies edgiang Dirty Shirts, 13-12 to lay claim to the league's playoff championship crown.

Ev went down clutching the hand as teammates and players from Dirty Shirts converged on the pitching mound in genuine concern for her well-being.

Ev eventually finished the inning but relinquished mound duties in the third because of the injury.

Players and spectators alike voiced opinions ranging from slim to none in terms of the Shady Ladies chances if the sturdy Metler was declared 'hors de combat' - basically, unable to play.

Dirty Shirts took advantage of this unfortunate circumstance to move in front, 8-5 after three full innings of play.

Metler returned to action in the fourth inning - despite a bruised and obviously painful right hand and this proved to be the rallying point for the Shady Ladies.

Shady Ladies edged ahead, 13-11 after six full innings and - for both teams - the season came down to six outs.

Surprisingly, Shady Ladies were meekly retired, 1-2-3 in the top of the seventh.

Crunch time was at hand and once again, Ev Metler took matters in hand - injured hand in this case.

Metler enticed the first two Dirty Shirts batters to bow out on infield flys.

Two out, no sweat.

Raiders post impressive wins

Milton no match for Georgetown squad

Georgetown Pontiac-Buick Raiders coach, Peter Sturgeon, is the unflappable sort. He prefers keeping things on an even keel, rather than engaging in the roller coaster emotional ride that can occur by hitting too many peaks and plumbing too many valley depths.

He believes in his coaching philosophy, his system and feels that if his players work within themselves and his system, eventually success has to follow.

For the most part, the Raiders adhered to their coach's wishes in two exhibition games over the weekend and head into the final week of pre-season play sporting a 3-1 record.

The Raiders upended Milton

Merchants, 6-4, Friday night in Milton and proved to be less than gracious hosts Saturday evening at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena, dropping the Milton crew, 5-3 before hometown fans.

Both games were chippy affairs highlighted more by penalty box parades than smooth, skilful hockey.

Sturgeon, in his way, feels his team can play whatever type of hockey is required, with the bottom line being - winning.

After Saturday night's game, Sturgeon felt that preparations for the upcoming 1989-90 Central Ontario Junior "B" Hockey League

season, were right or schedule. "Our program is working well," he said. "The right attitude is there and the players are showing discipline. We'll be a hard-nosed, tough hockey team that comes to play every night.

"With the program we've implemented, if it's followed, we should be able to move into the league's higher ranks. Our goal is to be Number One. But we'll take it one shift, one game, one win at a

time." The capturing of the Sutherland Cup, symbolic of Junior "B" supremacy, is Sturgeon's ultimate goal. He makes no bones about his aspirations but obviously, more fine tuning is needed with the Raiders.

Friday night's game in Milton was tight through the first period and penalty-filled.

The score was tied, 2-2, as Kevin Dance and Robb Doucette scored for the Raiders, with Jeff Daw and Colin Grieves replying for Milton.

The Raiders' Kevin Brown and Milton's Ken Guilford went at each other and both were ejected.

Georgetown opened up a 4-2, twoperoid lead on goals by Ken Kosziwka and Darren Lang, then matched Milton's two-goal third period outburst to seal the 6-4 win.

The Raiders' Jay Jasper and Milton's Chad Hailday were both given the heave-ho in the third period.

Overall, the game saw 48 minors, eight major penalties and two game misconducts handed out. Sean Healy scored both third
